WOMAN ASSAULTED.

Miss Rosa Holley, of Washington, while in a helpless condition, was criminally assaulted at Germantown, Md., Saturday, and a warrant has been issued for George Cobarth, a white blacksmith of that town, who is charged with the crime.

The news of the assault has so aroused the people of Germantown and the vicinity that it is feared that an attempt at lynching may follow Cobarth's arrest. He is still at large, and was last seen at Boyds yesterday afternoon.

Miss Holley, who is about thirty-five years old, owns, in connection with her five sisters, a small place near Darnestown, which she occasionally visits.

While on her way Saturday from that place to Germantown to fulfill an engagement, she became ill, and to allay pain, she took a powder containing an opiate, which had been prescribed for her by her family physician.

She followed this powder too closely with another, and as a result, when she awoke from a train at Germantown she was dazed and almost helpless.

From her actions at the station the agent thought she was intoxicated, but she was not. She wandered from the station a few hundred yards and fell to the ground.

It is alleged that Cobarth found her and induced her to go to his room near by, where he is charged with keeping her until 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. At this time some one passing heard her, it is alleged, pleading with Cobarth to release her, promising him money if he would do so.

Several men were notified and the woman was forcibly taken from the room to the house of Dr. John Rome, where her injuries were attended to. Cobarth, it is alleged, immediately fled. Miss Holley was afterwards removed to the home of her friend, American Biggs, near Darnestown. She is in a very critical condition.

As soon as the warrant was sworn out Sheriff Williams and his deputies immediately took up the trail of Cobarth tracing him to Boyds. His arrest is expected before morning.

Church Arraigned.

"I am surprised and astonished at the way the so-called Christian business men keeps his pledges to his God and his church. The churches do not seem to be much more than social organizations now. They spend more time developing along social lines than they do along spiritual lines."

Before sailing for Europe yesterday Rev. G. Campbell Morgan, the London evangelist, scathingly arraigned the condition of churches in America and the attitude of their members toward them. Beginning with the sentence quoted above he continued:

"Now why is this a condition? Because the business men, the influential Christians and those who are in position do not do their duty. Wrapped up in their own affairs or busy in the pursuit of pleasure or frivolity they lose track of the way and forget the pledges they made to their church. The old fire and the old-time spirit are lacking, and without this what can be expected by social clubs and a leading away from God and the path? Many a man whose name is on a church roll is not doing his part in the conversion of the sinner or the spread of the gospel. How can a business man expect to have an influence with his employees when they know his life, his methods and just how far he practices what he preaches? What the churches want is more of God and less of dress and social position; more of the spirit of the Master and less of a strife for place and money, and more religion by example and life than by preaching and talking. Follow God in the life and you become a continual sermon for him."

Assault Justified.

"I always hold," said Justice Crutchfield in Richmond yesterday morning, as he discharged Police Commissioner Chr. Manning, upon trial for assaulting C. N. Goodwin, "that when a man is called a liar he has a right to punch the man who called him that."

This elemental principle of justice, which has become an unwritten statute in the court of Justice Crutchfield, effectively disposed of a case that has attracted attention in Richmond in the past few days. Mr. Goodwin, it appears from the testimony, discussed Mr. Manning's character with a number of political sympathizers, concluding with a statement that the police commissioner was a crook. He was induced to repeat this statement before Mr. Manning while the latter was standing on Main street Tuesday afternoon.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

August 19, 1905. Notice is hereby given that the channels through draw of Potomac Highway Bridge will be closed during erection of draw span, commencing this date, and that all vessels passing through bridge will be compelled temporarily to pass between piers No. 6 and No. 7, being span next draw on Washington side of channel. Eighteen feet of water can be carried here at mean low tide, this minimum depth prevailing for width of one-half of opening on side adjacent to draw, the opposite half shoaling rapidly to about ten feet depth at pier No. 6. It is suggested that masters of deep draft vessels keep safely on channel side of passage and that no more than one vessel attempt to pass through at one time. R. L. HOXIE, Lieut. Col.
