The Revenue Office.

Police Court.

[Justice H. B. Caton presiding.] The following cases were disposed of this morning: John Hansbrough, arrested by Officer Young for non-support of his family, was dismissed upon a promise to take care of those dependent upon him.

Reporters in the Dock.

Attaches of newspapers who attend the Police Court are by no means pleased with the new arrangements which have been made in the room. The prisoners' dock has been graciously turned over to the knights of the quill where they are nearly a foot below the justice, lawyers and prisoners.

Attempt to Escape.

Houston Burke and Lewis Sykes, the two soldiers who cut and assaulted William Mankin in a north Lee street resort several weeks ago, made preparations last night to escape from jail, where they are to be confined until the next term of the Corporation Court.

Funeral.

As has been stated in the Gazette, the funeral of the late John S. Beach will take place tomorrow morning. Services will be held at the residence on north St. Asaph street by Rev. Messrs. Stump and Ewell at 7 o'clock.

White Arrested.

Richard White, who is charged with being responsible for the death of Henry Beverly, was arrested yesterday afternoon in Washington. The Virginia authorities were notified, and they sent a constable after the prisoner and took him to the jail in Alexandria county, Beverly, a Jackson city negro, was accidentally shot in a house boat at the Virginia end of the Long Bridge on Labor Day and died at the Emergency Hospital, Washington, Monday afternoon.

W. C. T. U.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union holds a prayer meeting every Thursday evening at the Children's Home, corner Duke and Royal streets. On tomorrow evening Mr. C. N. Critenden, the founder of the Florence Critenden mission work, will deliver an address at the meeting.

School Permits.

The clerk of the City School Board today issued 41 permits to children to attend the public schools—21 to white boys and 20 to white girls. This makes 1,168 permits issued to white children during the week—545 to boys and 604 to girls.

Narrow Escape.

The fire in the frame house on the east side of Henry street, near Duke, on Monday night, was, it is said, caused by a black cat springing after a rat and upsetting a lighted lamp. Four colored men were sleeping in the room at the time and one, Campbell by name, had a narrow escape from burning to death. He lost most of his clothing.

Stabbed.

John Jordan and Ed. Williams, both colored, became engaged in a dispute on one of the wharves this afternoon, during which the former stabbed Williams below the heart. Officers Ferguson and Smith arrested Jordan and sent Williams to the Alexandria Hospital, but later the officers were requested to repair to that institution. The trouble arose over a wager, Williams having bet Jordan he could not drink a pint of whisky. The latter performed the feat. Dr. Dolaney rendered surgical assistance and Officers Ferguson and Smith had to hold Williams down on the dissecting table. His injuries are serious.

Struck by Train.

Gustavus Williams, who was crossing the electric railway track near Arlington Junction about noon today, was struck by a train and seriously injured. The train was stopped, and the injured man placed aboard and brought to this city. The Alexandria Hospital had been notified and the ambulance was at the Royal street station when the train arrived. Mr. Williams was taken to the hospital where he received attention. The injured man is deaf and did not hear the train approaching. He is a native of Loudoun county, is a carpenter by trade and is 55 years old.

Capt. Stuart Censured.

A report has been received by President Roosevelt from the Civil Service Commission regarding an investigation of charges recently made against J. E. B. Stuart, collector of customs at Newport News, alleging political activity and undue partisanship in the conduct of his office. When Stuart assumed the duties of his office he said that he had a larger number of deputies than was needed to transact its business. He dismissed several of them. It so happened that the men dismissed were democrats. Collector Stuart also entered actively into politics, and in one nominating convention several of the assistants in his office were delegates. These conditions developed the charges which were made against him to the Civil Service Commission. Commissioner Cooley recently made a report to the President on the charges. As a result, Collector Stuart has been directed that if the business of his office should make necessary the employment of additional assistants he shall reappoint the men recently dismissed, if they should desire to return to the government service, and he has been admonished not to be so partisan in his political efforts.

New York Life Insurance Company. Edmund D. Randolph, treasurer of the New York Life Insurance Company, yesterday admitted under pressure that his company, through Vice President Perkins, sold to J. P. Morgan & Co. \$800,000 of bonds one day and bought them back the next.

This was in order to keep the total amount of the stock which the company held below a certain figure in the report which had to be made to the State Superintendent of Insurance. Mr. Randolph admitted also that while his company did not make collateral loans, it lent money to a trust company allied to it, which made the collateral loans.

He told of a sale of \$300,000 of stock to a London firm for \$720,000, the loss of \$80,000 being charged to the profit and loss account.

He declined to give the names of men who, by failing to keep their promise to join in handing the stock of the New Orleans Railroad, caused the New York Life to lose in this transaction.

Miss Stuart Speaks.

Miss Sallie Stuart, president of the Virginia branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, paid an official visit to the Christ Church branch in Millwood Thursday. Miss Stuart was met at the station in Boyce by Mrs. Hugh M. Nelson and driven to Brexton, the home of Miss Mary Page, in Millwood, where she is staying. At 5 p. m. in the Baptist Chapel Miss Stuart gave one of her inspiring and interesting talks to the members of the auxiliary and to a most appreciative audience. She described the work in the Rugged Mountain Mission in a most graphic manner and gave a very interesting account of the dedication of the Whittle Memorial Chapel, besides touching on Brazil, Alaska, China and other subjects of interest to the members of the auxiliary.

Horrible Domestic Tragedy.

While his wife sat by his bedside E. Morgan, a rich farmer, living three miles from Corinth, Ky., yesterday suddenly seized a razor and cut her throat. Almost immediately Morgan drew the razor across his own throat. Physicians said that it would be impossible for either to recover. The tragedy was witnessed by two young children of Morgan, who were found sitting in the room, calling upon their parents to speak to them. Morgan had been ill for eight weeks with typhoid fever and grew despondent, believing recovery was impossible.
