Attempted Suicide.

Frank H. Gibson, a prisoner in the U. S. marshal's office, in Baltimore, and his alleged wife swallowed a quantity of red precipitate of mercury in an anteroom yesterday and were promptly relieved at the City Hospital. Gibson was indicted by the United States grand jury on the charge of using the mails to defraud. He was taken from jail to the marshal's office in the morning so that he would be on hand if he desired to plead to the charge, and his wife was allowed to keep him company during the day in the anteroom. Gibson was indicted under the aliases of Edwin F. Gray and Edwin F. Brown. He was arrested in Philadelphia several months ago and has been in jail in Baltimore since. He is charged with operating at Laurel, Md., under the name of Edwin F. Gray, a banker. It is alleged that he obtained valuable sets of books from publishers and sold them to second-hand dealers. He appears to be about 50 years old and his wife 10 or 15 years younger. Gibson, who claims to have been a newspaper editor and magazine writer, gave his former address as 4118 Powelton avenue, Philadelphia, although, according to the postal authorities, he is also credited with residences at various times in Laurel, Richmond, Front Royal, Va., Snow Hill, Md., Alexandria, Va., and other places. Mrs. Frank H. Gibson is said to be living with her mother, at Herndon, Fairfax county. She has, it is alleged, been trying for several months to locate her husband. She came to this city recently seeking the assistance of the police in the effort to find Gibson. She stated that he had deserted her and his two little children, leaving them dependent upon her mother for support. It was alleged that Gibson was running a matrimonial bureau and was traveling with another woman as his wife. Mrs. Gibson said she would institute divorce proceedings, and declared her intention to aid in her husband's prosecution, if she could ever ascertain his whereabouts. Before deserting his wife Gibson stayed in Alexandria a few weeks. He claimed to be a newspaper man, and said he had written, covering many board bills.

Judge Surprised Jurors.

The remaining cases against Arthur Wall and Percy T. Pumphrey, the former indicted for violating the gaming laws by selling books on foreign horse races at the Kenilworth, Md., pool-room, Bladensburg district, and the latter charged, on a single count, with permitting the selling of books on his premises, came up yesterday and were continued until the next term of court, in April. Wall's bond was renewed. When the cases had been disposed of, Judge George C. Merrick, who sat during the two-day trial of the first case against the accused, on which the jury returned a verdict of not guilty, surprised the jurors, attorneys and others present by the following statement: "I want to say to the defendant that the jury has brought in a verdict of 'not guilty,' but that does not necessarily mean that the party accused did not commit the offense charged against him. It may be that he had the benefit of doubt; it may be, as probably was the case, that the jury did not think the offense was committed. I want to say that the court was amazed at the verdict of the jury, in view of the testimony. I cannot see how it was possible for them to reach that conclusion; but that is a matter with them. I will say that, having heard all the testimony Thursday, I will warn this defendant that he had better be cautious, for as far as the power of this court can reach when it is legitimately extended, and every effort that this court can use within the bounds of law and right, will be exercised to break up this business that, upon the testimony of sworn witnesses, Thursday, has been carried on in Prince George's county. When you give bond for your appearance in court you will be discharged."

Cold Wave.

A cold wave struck this city and vicinity late yesterday evening. The rainy weather which had prevailed during the day was followed by high north-west winds and a sudden drop in the temperature. The heavens became clear during the night and the weather today has been fair and cool, so much so that fires were found to be comfortable.

Jr. O. U. A. M.

As heretofore announced in the Gazette the Jr. O. U. A. M. will hold a special meeting this evening. The degrees of the order will be conferred by Alexandria Council No. 33, assisted by Belle Haven Council No. 61, upon a class. C., Mr. Eugene Culver of Berkeley, and representatives from Richmond will be present. The meeting promises to be one of the most successful ever held by the local councils.

Anniversary of Disaster.

Twenty-seven years ago tomorrow night the steamer Express foundered in a storm in Chesapeake bay, near the mouth of the Potomac. The ill-fated steamer was many years ago a towboat at Norfolk, but about the close of the war she was taken to Baltimore and lengthened and placed on the route between Washington, Alexandria, river landings and Baltimore. She was a side-wheel boat with a sliding beam. She left Baltimore on Tuesday evening October 22 and was caught in a severe storm in the bay. The wind blew a gale, demolished the steamer's upper works and rendered her unmanageable. She afterwards sank. A number of people were drowned.

L. Boothe, voting to adjourn sine die.

Mr. John Starnell, of Fairfax county, today arrested John Scrif on the charge of stealing a cow from Mrs. Downey at Spring Bank a few days ago. Lieutenant Smith sent Officer Sherwood to meet Mr. Starnell and with him bring the prisoner to this city. Scrif, it is said, admits stealing the cow and selling it at an Alexandria county slaughter house.

Engineer Scalded.

Engineer O'Neal of a freight train on the Washington and Ohio Railroad was severely scalded at Bluemont yesterday by the explosion of the arch pipe of his locomotive. Fireman Johnson was blown back into the tender by the escaping steam, but escaped serious injury.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

Some of the fire hydrants are being painted white, while the letter boxes are being given a green coat of paint.

It is understood that Secretary Shaw will speak in this city on the night of October 31, instead of the 30th, as at first understood.

Messrs. Kelly & Son are making good progress in paving Wolfe street between Lee and Union and expect to complete the work next week.

The funeral of the late John H. Cole took place from Sharon Church, Fairfax county, this afternoon. Rev. Dr. Fisher, of the Baptist Church, of this city, officiated.

A fire occurred in the Pennsylvania Railroad yards near Rosslyn, in the county, at an early hour this morning, during which three cars with their contents were destroyed.

Workmen are engaged in making improvements at the new union depot. A large space on the south side of the building is being leveled preparatory to the laying of a granolithic pavement.

The entire southeastern section of the city was in darkness last night by reason of the absence of the electric lights. The night was dark, and a high wind prevailed; hence but few people were on the streets.

The tugboats Cushing and Gibbon, now at the wharves, are to have extensive repairs. Messrs. J. & H. Aitchison have the contracts for the repairs and alterations to the vessels which will aggregate \$4,000.

The alarm of fire early last night was caused by a fire in a small frame house occupied by colored persons on the east side of Pitt street, between Gibbon and Franklin. The department soon extinguished the flames which were in the roof.
