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RISE OF WITTE.

It was persistently reported in the clubs and in government circles in St. Petersburg late last night that the Emperor has appointed Count Witte premier, with the portfolio of minister of finance. All the papers yesterday morning gave prominence to the report.

The Count's sudden rise in imperial favor is causing consternation among the grand dukes.

Since his return from the United States Witte has boldly ranged himself on the side of the liberals, and has not only advocated complete liberty of speech, of the press and of assembly as a necessary corollary of the coming duma, but has urged the extension of the powers of the duma along the lines demanded by the reformers, as well as a broader franchise, so as to admit of fuller representation from the ranks of labor and the cultured classes.

The Emperor, to whom the Count personally outlined his views, displayed much sympathy with them, and it is learned favored a number of ministers suggested by the Count, including General Trepot, assistant minister of the interior, who now ranks as one of the most broad-minded of the Czar's counselors and who is understood to be working harmoniously with Count Witte.

The newly formulated statute governing the right of assembly was generally recognized as not being broad enough, even before its promulgation, and the Solovki reform commission is now at work on a more liberal draft.

The reception of the Countess Witte by the Emperor yesterday is considered a singular evidence of the Emperor's determination to confide his fortunes to the hands of Count Witte. No other interpretation is placed upon it in court circles, where the reception of the Countess created a tremendous sensation.

The Countess is a Jewess of ordinary birth and had never before been received at court. When M. Witte was appointed minister in the nineties, the Emperor was reported to have said to him: "Remember, you are not married."

The fixing of his wife's social status, which has been one of Count Witte's ambitions, must rank as one of the triumphs of his life.

The decrease of the influence of the Grand Dukes perhaps made it easier for the Emperor to turn to Count Witte. The resignation of Grand Duke Vladimir, the Emperor's uncle, as commander-in-chief of the military district of St. Petersburg, however, has not yet been accepted. In tendering his resignation the Grand Duke wrote to the Emperor substantially as follows:

"I have served your grandfather, your father and yourself; but now that your majesty has disgraced my son I no longer have the heart to serve you."

The Emperor is said to favor even depriving Grand Duke Cyril of the title of grand duke, saying that he should be known simply as "Monsieur Romanoff."

Teamsters' Strike.

The teamsters employed by Thomas Orr, a boss truckman, of New York, who does all the hauling for H. J. Libby & Co., threatens to spread to all teamsters in the city, in which case some 50,000 men will be involved.

The strikers fully expect to see a general strike in a few days. The employers were in session for several hours yesterday and adopted resolutions to maintain the open shop and to refuse to make any concessions to the strikers.

The seriousness of the situation was emphasized yesterday when an office for the employment of strike breakers was opened and a number of Pinkerton men took their stations along White street.

So far there has been no violence whatever. The strikers say: "We are not demanding what is strictly called a closed shop. We do not assume to dictate whom the employers shall hire, but we do demand that if they shall hire non-union men these men must join the union at the first regular meeting following their employment."

We ask for a working day of 10 hours and 25 cents an hour for overtime. We ask for drivers of four-horse teams \$18 a week, for three-horse drivers \$17, for two-horse drivers \$15 and for single-horse drivers \$13. We do not regard this as exorbitant. We believe we are entitled to some consideration, and are ready to accept in our union any man the employers choose to hire."

Teamsters in the machinery-moving and rigging industry of Chicago have voted to walk out Thursday morning in a general strike against teaming contractors who do the hauling for machinery manufacturers and heavy electrical-contracting companies. The drivers are employed chiefly by a score of firms in the Chicago Team Owners' Association, and the total membership of this association furnishes work for 8,000 union teamsters in Chicago. The drivers who threaten to strike are members of the Machinery and Sea Teamsters' and Rigging Union, No. 14, of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. Before the strike vote was taken the local union had filed demands upon the teaming contractors for a wage increase. The employers refuse to make concessions.
