**Murdered in Revenge.**

The Wilkes-Barre, Pa., police now believe that the murder of the Italian Black Hand Society leader, known as Luciano Parrenno, at Brownstown, on Sunday morning, was a result of the vengeance of friends of Benedetto Modina, the victim of the celebrated barrel murder mystery in New York, in 1903.

They learned that the name of Sunday's victim is really Tomaso Potto, or El Toro Potto ("Potto the Bull"), who was the chief of the men arrested in New York for the barrel murder. Potto had a knife and the pawn ticket for a watch owned by the victim when arrested, but the police were unable to convict him, and after being in custody thirteen months he was released. He left New York immediately, fearing, the police believe, the vengeance of Modina's friends, and it now develops that the name of Parrenno, and settled at Brownstown, where he became the leader of the Black Hand in that city, and was soon known as a bad man. Giuseppe Deprimo, brother-in-law of Modina, who was imprisoned at the time of the murder, and swore to be revenged on the murderers, was released from jail two weeks ago. The police are now trying to learn if there is any connection between his release and the murder of Sunday morning.

**Remarkable Mirage.**

On the night of August 15, when the whaling bark Gayhead was cruising about 75 miles west of Pribiloff Island, in Bering Sea, Mate Pease and the men on deck were thunderstruck by the appearance of a great city immediately ahead.

There was the shore line, and rising above it were thousands of electric lights twinkling along a hundred streets. Here and there, apparently at prominent corners, were larger lights, and along the shores were a myriad of lights showing at the wharves.

But the mate and his men knew that this must be a mirage and that for hundreds of miles beyond where these lights flared out was only an expanse of water. The mate called Captain Fisher, and he looked upon the scene and was bewildered. There was no accounting for the wonderful sight. This city seemed as real as San Francisco seems to a vessel anchored in the channel near Goat Island.

When daylight came the spectacle faded away, and in all directions was only the heaving bosom of the sea, with no land in sight and no great city within thousands of miles.

**Quality of Kansas Whisky.**

The quality of whisky sold in Kansas through the joints and by traveling bootleggers was revealed Monday at Fredonia when, under the order of Gov. Hoch, 513 cases and 6,000 bottles of whisky were publicly destroyed in the court house square while a band played temperance melodies. The contents of the bottles were poured into the sewers and yesterday the people of Neodesha, a few miles below, complained of the contamination of the water by the liquor which poured down Fall river and into Neodesha's service pipes. When the thousands of bottles were broken a carload of them were thrown in a heap in the court house yard. What beer and whisky remained in the fragments of bottles trickled through the grass across the court yard, making a path several feet wide. On Tuesday night this path was marked by dead grass, which had been green the day before. A dispatch from Fredonia says the grass is drying enough to burn. This furnishes striking testimony of the quality of liquors now being sold in Kansas.

**Improvements at the Capitol.**

When the senators and representatives return to Washington to attend the approaching session of Congress they will be astonished at the transformation at the Capitol. All the floors have been equipped with exhaust fans and other apparatus to stop the smoke from the fireplaces going the wrong way.

The entire upper portion of the rotunda has been cleaned and painted, and the "steamboat plant" of the sandstone walls, has been completely scraped away, revealing the beautiful red brown color and stratification of the walls. The rotunda now reminds one of the interior of a Greek temple. The color of the walls, the graining or stratification of the stone harmonize with the historical paintings above, while in place of the old gas jets there has been installed 1,900 incandescent lights.

Old and obsolete plumbing has been replaced with an up-to-date system, and the whole building has received a thorough washing and scrubbing from top to bottom.
