RED FLAG IN NEW YORK.

City Hall Park, New York, was the scene of disorder and excitement yesterday afternoon.

The turmoil began with the erection of a campaign banner which bore the red flag of anarchy and the Stars and Stripes. The flags were each grasped by a hand, the red flag bearing the name of Hearst and the American flag that of McClellan. Running along the bottom border of the banner was the inscription, "Under Which Flag?"

No sooner had the banner been stretched between the statue of Benjamin Franklin and City Hall Park than hundreds of loiterers in the neighborhood gathered around the statue, which is immediately in front of the office of Mr. Hearst's German paper, the Morgen Journal. With cries for the leader of the municipal ownership issue, more than 4,000 persons gathered to listen to speeches by volunteers.

Tammany was scored for erecting the banner, and at each mention of Hearst's name there were cheers. While the excitement was at its height some one in the crowd called for volunteers to tear down the banner. This was greeted by a shout of approval, and William Houston, a blacksmith in the Brooklyn navy yard, began to climb the pole.

At this point Roundsman Conlin, of the City Hall station, with 15 policemen arrived, and the crowd was scattered. Policeman James Sullivan shouted for Houston to come down, but the man kept on.

"If you can climb, so can I," said Sullivan, and, like a squirrel, he began to go up the staff, which swayed dangerously under the weight of the two men. Houston had a knife between his teeth with which he expected to slash the ropes and let the banner to the street. He saw the policemen in earnest, however, and started back to earth, where he was arrested. Houston was taken to the Tombs Police Court and arraigned before Magistrate Wahle, who reprimanded and discharged him.

Following the arrest of Houston an attempt was made by fully 2,000 persons to storm the City Hall. There were many innocent persons in the crowd who were swept along by several hundred young men and boys. A few of them were daring enough to enter the corridors, but were promptly chased to the steps by a janitor with a broom.

The men and boys stood for several minutes upon the steps, shouting for Mayor McClellan to come out. There was no semblance of order, although the leaders said they were there to enter protest against the erection of the banner, which they said was an insult to the American flag.

"Hurrah for Hearst!" yelled a small boy, and a yell was given by a majority of the crowd.

"McClellan!" the cry continued, but the mayor was at luncheon.

The reserves from the Third, Fifth and Sixth precincts soon had the crowd scattered.

Later, when a man who said that he was acting under orders, removed the obnoxious banner, police reserves were again called out to prevent a crowd from destroying it. It was announced that a regular campaign banner would be displayed in its place.

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Rector Appointed Mayor.

Through an order issued by Judge Harrison in the Circuit Court at Winchester, it is developed that the town of Middletown, Frederick county, has had no mayor, town councilmen or other town officers for at least six years, and no taxes have been collected in that time. This condition of affairs is the outcome of the wholesale burning of property some years ago, for complicity in which former Mayor David E. Edmondson was indicted, a woman figuring prominently in the trials. Edmondson was acquitted in court at Winchester.

Judge Harrison yesterday signed an order appointing as mayor Rev. F. Leslie Robinson, who is a native of England and rector of the Protestant Episcopal Church at Middletown. James H. Light is appointed town sergeant, and seven councilmen are named. All are required to qualify for office within the next 30 days. Former Mayor Edmondson obtained a judgment for a small amount against the corporation of Middletown, and in order to enforce the payment of the debt he had to secure a writ of mandamus from Judge Harrison, requiring the collection of taxes. These taxes, it is said, have never been collected, and the debt is yet unpaid.

During the past six years several men have been elected as mayor of Middletown but in every instance they have declined to serve. In the meantime pretenders to the office have arisen, but their orders have not been obeyed, and by the majority of the people of the town they have been looked upon with disfavor. With the appointment of Rev. Mr. Robinson as mayor and the other officers it is expected that the tangled condition of Middletown municipal affairs will be straightened out.

The town is next in size to Winchester and is beautifully situated in the Shenandoah Valley. Its population numbers over two thousand.
