The Indian woman, isolated from the outer world by custom, is again by custom isolated as far as practically from all the male members of that little inner world to which she is confined. Free intercourse, even with her own husband, is not permitted here while yet her youthful capabilities for joyousness exist. No wonder, then, that absence of jollity is characteristic of the Indians generally, for the happy laughter of a home is denied them by custom in the most persistent manner.
