Woman Mysteriously Shot.

"Lottie Miller," as she was known about the Tenderloin, in New York, is dead with a bullet through her heart.

The police are very anxious to find Roy L. Miller, a youth of twenty years, who lived with the young woman in two rooms at 130 east Forty-third street, and who was with her when she was shot.

Miller had been employed for a month as telephone operator at the Hotel Manhattan. He and the woman went to live in the rooms about three weeks ago.

About 3:45 o'clock yesterday morning Horace M. Hedden, a traveling salesman, living on the same floor, was aroused by loud knocking. He called out, asking what was wanted.

"For God's sake," came the reply. "There's some one out here and I need help."

Hedden opened the door and there stood Miller. He led the way to his rooms and stretched out on the floor was the woman, holding her hand tightly to her left breast and breathing heavily.

Miller knelt down beside the woman and in pleading tones urged her to say that she had shot herself.

"Tell this man that you did it," Hedden says Miller begged, "and tell him quick."

No reply came, however, and Hedden hurried out for help. Returning a few minutes later with a policeman and a doctor, he found the woman dead and Miller gone. An all-day search failed to locate the man.

By letters found in the woman's room it was learned that her real name was Nellie Brod, and that she had a sister, Mrs. Thomas Hall, of Lattimer Mines, Pennsylvania.

A woman friend of the dead woman is authority for the statement that the latter expected to leave New York today to spend some time with her sister in Pennsylvania. The story has led the police to formulate a theory that Miller may have killed her during a quarrel growing out of the fact that the woman was about to leave him.

Mrs. Thomas Hall, of Lattimer, Pa., last night said that her sister, Nellie Brod, had left Lattimer about three years ago, and had been living in New York ever since. Mrs. Hall knew nothing about Miller, or where he came from.

A Defiant Woman.

Mrs. Ina Berry, of Spokane, who suddenly became insane on a St. Louis and San Francisco passenger train Saturday and drove out all the passengers with a revolver, was still in possession of the passenger coach at Girard, Kan. No efforts were made during the day to capture her other than by persuasion, and she threatened to shoot if not left alone.

On Saturday night a dummy was fixed up and moved toward the door of the toilet room, where she has been confined, and she fired a shot from above the transom, the bullet striking the dummy squarely on top of the head. During the day the city marshal received a telegram from Vancouver, Wash., asking if the woman was a daughter of Col. Bainbridge, of that place. There has been no fire in the car since it was sidetracked at Girard, and the woman has had nothing to eat, unless she had something with her when entered the toilet room. Offers have been made to her of provisions, but she refused to receive anything and threatened to shoot any one who would build a fire.

Robert M. Hams, of Winfield, Kans., went to Girard yesterday afternoon to ascertain if the woman was his sister, but after talking to her at a distance concluded that he did not know her. She told him to go away or she would shoot him.

Farmers' Phenomenal Prosperity.

The economic position of the American farmer resulting from his past year's labor, summarized by Secretary of Agriculture Wilson in his annual report, recently published, is an increase of wealth amounting to \$6,415,000,000.

Secretary Wilson says that never before in the history of this or any other country has such a tremendous result been obtained. The money received from the sale of eggs, poultry and dairy products alone more than equaled the value of the iron and steel industries. The year's corn crop was worth \$1,216,000,000, and \$605,000,000 worth of hay was harvested, which is \$1,000,000 more than the value of the cotton crop. The Secretary says that the farmers have reversed the international trade balance and are building up one favorable to this country, and within a decade have become bankers and money lenders. The value of other crops is given as follows: wheat, \$525,000,000; oats, \$282,000,000; potatoes, \$138,000,000; barley, \$58,000,000; tobacco, \$52,000,000; sugar cane and beets, \$50,000,000; and rice, \$13,820,000. The total value of daily products for the year was \$625,000,000, and of the poultry industry, \$500,000,000. Beef cattle brought to the raisers \$662,000,000, and sheep and swine, \$283,000,000.

Socialism in London.

As was stated in the Gazette, the attempt on the part of the socialistic element of the unemployed workmen of London to hold a demonstration in front of the Guildhall Friday was met with police opposition, resulting in disturbances and the arrest of five of the agitators.

A meeting of the central committee, called to consider the question of the allocation of the fund for the unemployed, was in progress in the Guildhall at the time, and the demonstration of the socialists was intended to impress the committee.

One of the leaders was denouncing the governing classes, and railing against the fact that the unemployed were compelled to accept charity, and had proposed that the workmen march to the West End when he was handed an official communication commanding him to desist.

The crowd then became unruly, and was dispersed by 300 policemen, who were accompanied by detectives disguised as unemployed workmen. Those resisting were arrested. The crowd scattered, shouting and crying "Down with our bulldog tyrant," and giving other evidences of its antagonistic attitude.
