A Ghastly Find.
The dead body of a well-dressed man was found in the woods one mile south of the Roanoke city limits yesterday afternoon by Cameron Layman, a farmer. The head had been taken from the body by dogs, the skull being found 25 yards away from where the trunk lay. There was a bullet wound in the center of the forehead. From the condition of the body, which was discovered in a ravine a quarter of a mile from Mountain Park Casino, it must have been dead for a week or 10 days. By the side of the body lay a 38-caliber pistol with one empty shell and four loaded shells. In the trousers pocket was found \$65.20, in the waistcoat pocket a fone gold watch, which was attached to a heavy gold chain. Between the trunk and the severed head was found part of a gray wig, which would indicate the victim was an elderly man. The hands and attire indicate that he was refined and stylish. In the pockets were also found a railroad ticket from Charleston, W. Va., to Bristol, Tenn., dated January 4. Besides this there was an aluminum tag or check two inches square with the following stamped on it: 'C Preferred Accident Insurance Company, New York, 243431. I found return to C. D. Clinton, manager, 1205 Park Building, Pittsburgh, Pa.' There were no other records about the body, the only other mark being the words, 'Pittsburg, Pa.' stamped on the leather part of the suspenders.

Broke Ice for a Baptism.
Though the ice was about two inches thick on Bosley's pond near Texas, Md., a colored woman braved the cold on Sunday and was baptized. An axe was required to make a hole large enough for the immersion. The minister was Rev. William Gray, colored, and the woman immersed in the wife of Frank Carter. The ceremony took place from 1 to 2 p. m. and was witnessed by about 300 persons. When the preacher and the woman stepped into the icy water a number of the spectators unconsciously ejaculated "Ouch!" The couple, however, apparently did not mind their cold bath. When it was all over and they stepped out they were met by two colored women, who carefully covered them with blankets. The woman was dressed in white. The water in the pond reached to the waist of those who went in, but the minister and the candidate were apparently no worse for their experience. Friends surrounded them, and there was a warm shaking of hands all around.

Contest Over Mayoralty.
Rev. F. Leslie Robinson, a minister of the Episcopal Church and mayor of Middletown, Frederick county, appealed in Judge T. W. Harrison's court at Winchester yesterday and secured a peremptory mandamus against A. W. Brown, who also claims to be mayor of Middletown. Brown is required to turn over to Mayor Robinson at once all books, records, franchises, &c., and all papers pertaining to the office of mayor of Middletown. Brown contends that he was elected the mayor of that town ten years ago, but evidence was produced to show that he had never taken the oath of office and was not legally the mayor. For six years Middletown had been without a mayor, until several months ago when Judge Harrison appointed Rev. Mr. Robinson to that office. The latter, who is rector of the Episcopal Church at Middletown, is an Englishman and had to be naturalized before he could accept the appointment. Until Mayor Robinson secured the mandamus against him, Mr. Brown had laid claim to the office of mayor. The court held that Brown had no right to retain possession of the books, records, and franchises in the mayor's office.

Killed His Fiance.
Because she wished to postpone her wedding day, set for Wednesday, Mrs. Eva Kennedy, of Dayton, Ohio, is dead with a bullet hole in her heart and Roy Mendenhall is at the hospital with two self-inflicted revolver wounds, which probably will cause death. Mrs. Kennedy and Mendenhall had been engaged for sometime. They frequently quarreled, but always made up. On Sunday night Mrs. Kennedy pleaded for a postponement of the wedding, which the couple had planned to take place Wednesday. Mendenhall objected. The argument led to a long, bitter quarrel. Early yesterday morning, in disappointment, jealous rage, Mendenhall pressed a revolver to the woman's breast and ended her life. He then turned the weapon on himself, inflicting two probably fatal body wounds.
