THE LEGISLATURE.

SENATE.

The Senate Saturday received the report of the investigating committee, rejecting the appointment of E. H. Clowes as a director of the Eastern State Hospital...

The Senate engaged the Sadler bill increasing the salaries of the members. The bill, which originally provided for \$5 a day, was amended so as to make the pay for the 60-day's regular session, \$500 and \$250 for a special session...

As stated on Saturday, Mr. Mache's resolution providing for a change in the Constitution so as to increase the session to 90 days was adopted.

The Senate refused to concur in the Mouse amendments to the general appropriation bill, and a conference was requested between the two committees.

The bill to provide for the purchase of a silver service to be presented to the battleship Virginia was taken up and passed.

The movement for an extra session was snuffed under in the House by the adoption of the rules committee's substitute by a vote of 49 to 19.

The Byrd automobile bill, which, because of its severe restrictions on automobilists on country roads, has been strongly contested, was passed by a vote of 67 to 10.

The Senate bill providing for the re-districting of the judicial circuits was taken up, having been advanced by special order and was declared passed.

"That's illegal," shouted several members. A motion to reconsider was rejected, and was followed by a bedlamlike confusion.

Copenhagen, March 5.—A movement which has been started in Iceland to declare the island independent of Denmark, has caused considerable uneasiness here.

Tangier, Morocco, March 5.—Fighting between the followers of Raisuli, the bandit chief, and the Kabyle tribes began last night at Beninas, a four-hour journey from here.

Portland, Me., March 5.—This city had an earthquake shock and an ice storm early yesterday that caused considerable apprehension. A distinct earthquake was felt at 12:57 o'clock.

Richmond, Va., March 5.—The House today passed the judicial circuit court bill making five new circuits. It now goes to the Senate where the amendments will be concurred in promptly and the bill will be signed by the Governor.
