The Legislature. [Special Dispatch to the Alexandria Gazette.] Richmond, March 8.—The House today, by a vote of 57 to 28, engrossed the Cotton rolling stock bill, but declined to take it up out of order for passage.

Conditions in Russia.

St. Petersburg, March 8.—The Russian government has decided to continue its policy of repression throughout the country, fearing there will be a renewal of former rioting in the spring.

Crisis in France.

Paris, March 8.—President Fallieres today called both President Dubost of the Senate and President Doumer of the Chamber of Deputies to the Elysee to discuss the crisis caused by the sudden resignation last night of the Rouvier ministry.

Distress Signals.

Santa Barba, Cal., March 8.—A steamer, evidently a passenger boat, is sending distress signals about 15 miles off shore, sixty miles north of this port.

Operators and Miners.

New York, March 8.—Coal circles evince a feeling of quiet uneasiness today because of the attitude of several of the bituminous operators in the middle west in declaring their intention of facing a strike, rather than grant the demands of the miners.

Italian Laborers Killed.

Greensburg, Pa., March 8.—About 7 o'clock this morning near Radebaugh, on the Pennsylvania Railroad, a milk-train collided with a work train, on which were about 75 Italian laborers employed on the pipe line.

Killed by Falling Rock.

Tromsheim, Norway, March 8.—Fishermen returning here bring reports that a great fall of rock has occurred on one of the Lofoten Islands of the north-west coast of Norway.

Trans-Siberian Railroad.

Birmingham, Eng., March 8.—The P. & T. today says that the condition of the trans-Siberian railroad is most unsatisfactory and that the Russian government has arranged to charter 32 steamers for the purpose of bringing home the men and materials composing the Manchurian army.
