Local Matters.

Weather Probabilities.

For this section unsettled weather tonight and Saturday; probably showers; light variable winds.

Accosted the Wrong Lady.

Miss Kate Preston, the eighteen-year-old daughter of Mr. J. T. Preston, in company with another young lady, left the house of the former on Alford street, between King and Prince, shortly after 10 o'clock last night, and when they reached the vacant lot on the southwest corner of Prince and Alford streets a burly negro stepped from behind a tree and caught hold of Miss Preston. She ordered the negro to release her, but he refused to do so. Miss Preston's companion, knowing she had a pistol, suggested that she shoot her assailant. The darkey, upon hearing this, relaxed his hold upon the young woman when she stepped back, drew her pistol and discharged it at the rascal. The latter started to run, when Miss Preston again fired the pistol at the fugitive. A neighbor, in the meantime, blew a police whistle, when Officer Nicholson, who was about a square away, appeared. The negro, however, had in the meantime made his escape. Chief Goods, who was on King street, heard the reports of the pistol, and he also hastened to the scene. The young woman while in company with two female companions one night recently was accosted on the street by a negro, since which time she has been on the lookout for similar experiences, and last night, when she left her home with her companion, she took the precaution to carry a pistol. The family at one time lived at Cross, where they had to be on the lookout for tramps which at that time infested the neighborhood, and she learned early in life the use of a pistol.

Exciting Runaway.

A horse attached to a wagon belonging to M. Holzbein's bakery in Washington became frightened at a train of cars which emerged from the west end of the Wilkes street tunnel this morning and ran south on the pavement on the east side of Fairfax street. One of the men in charge of the wagon had hold of the bridle of the horse when it became frightened. He retained his hold and attempted to stop the animal, but to no purpose, and was dragged half a square. One of the horses' hoofs tore the man's shoe from his foot and he, falling, received painful injuries on other parts of his body. The wagon collided with a fence, tearing panels therefrom, and carried away a rainspout on a house farther down the square, also part of a fence. The horse was finally stopped. The watch of the man who received the injuries was smashed by the accident and the chain broken in pieces and scattered in the street, as were also most of the contents of the wagon, consisting of pies, cakes, bread, biscuits, &c.

Police Court.

[Justice H. B. Caton presiding.] The following cases were disposed of this morning:

Frank Gorman, Harry Williams and Michael Murphy, arrested by Chief Goods and Officers Smith, Ferguson and Bell charged with vagrancy, was sent to the chain gang for 20 days.

The Transfer Service.

It is again reported that orders have been issued for the abolition of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad transfer service between this city and Sh-pher's, on the opposite side of the river. It is also said that steps preliminary to such a procedure have been made, but nothing positive is, so far, known. About a year ago an order was issued to abolish the service, but it was later countermanded. Up to last Saturday night a double crew had been employed on the Brewster and barge. A single crew is again operating the transfer. Where the transfer of cars by the ferry shall have ceased the trains will pass over the Washington Southern Railway. This, however, it is thought will not be done until the new union yards north of Alexandria are completed.

The building will be the combination of eleven stores to front on both Fourteenth and R streets, with one apartment overhead, consisting of eleven rooms, and to be used by Mr. Looze for residential purposes. It is estimated that the cost of erection will be about \$25,000. The design is after the Spanish type of architecture.

Dental Examination.

The Virginia State Board of Dental Examiners, which had been in session in Richmond for several days, adjourned their annual meeting Friday night. Aside from the large class of applicants that were examined, many subjects of importance were discussed. Among them was the question of reciprocity between the States as to exchange of certificates.

A list of the successful candidates will be given out as soon as their papers are examined, which will take some time. Officers elected for the ensuing year were Dr. H. W. Campbell, Suffolk president; Dr. R. H. Walker, of Norfolk, secretary and treasurer, and Dr. John F. Stiff, of Fredericksburg, assistant secretary.

Animals and Fire.

Rattlesnakes won't run from fire, but instead strike till the last at the flames about them. This is true of many animals, especially of horses, who will rush back into a burning barn, apparently blind with rage, striking with their hoofs and swishing their tails in great anger.

The flight of wild birds during migrating time against lighthouses is more like the action of the green bicyclist who rides against a trolley car or wagon as if hypnotized by it and in spite of his fears.
