PROPOSALS.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the granting by the City Council of Alexandria, of the power and authority to the City Engineer to be exercised in the manner prescribed by law, of the right to furnish electricity for light, heat, power and any other general purposes to the City of Alexandria, and to the inhabitants thereof, and to erect, construct, and maintain the necessary poles and fixtures and to run wires on, over, under and along the streets, public alleys, bridges, parks, and other public ways and places in the City of Alexandria, for the purpose of supplying electricity.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Alexandria, Virginia: That there shall be granted in the manner prescribed in an act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved May 20, 1903, the rights and privileges on, over, under and along the streets, public alleys, bridges, parks, and other public ways and places in the City of Alexandria, which are embodied in the following draft of an ordinance:

Section 1. That the City Council of Alexandria, Virginia, do hereby grant the right to furnish electricity for light, heat, power and any other general purposes to the City of Alexandria and its inhabitants thereof, for a period of thirty years, and for the purpose of furnishing and supplying electricity for light, heat, power and any other general purposes to the City of Alexandria, and to the inhabitants thereof, upon the conditions, provisions and limitations hereinafter set forth, and under these set forth in such ordinances of the City of Alexandria, as may be applicable thereto, and as are not in conflict with this ordinance and the amendments hereto made or which may be hereafter made.

Section 2. That upon the approval of this ordinance by the Mayor of the City of Alexandria, it shall be the duty of the City Engineer to cause to be advertised once a week for four successive weeks, in a newspaper published in the City of Alexandria, a draft of the ordinance contained in the foregoing section, and in addition, he shall in such advertisement, invite bids for the franchise, privileges and rights proposed to be granted in the proposed ordinance, and also for the present electric plant, the city. The costs of this advertisement shall be reimbursed to the City Council of Alexandria by the person or corporation to whom the grant of this franchise is finally made.

The City Council will reserve the right to reject any and all bids. Every bidder will be required to file with his bid a certified check for five hundred dollars, payable to the order of the City Council of Alexandria, which certificate shall be held in escrow until the rejection of the bid, or if his bid is accepted and the above franchise awarded him, said certified check will be returned on the delivery to the City Council of the bond mentioned in sub-section of Section C of section 8, above.

The bids are to be delivered to the presiding officer of the Common Council of the City of Alexandria, at the day and hour of the next regular session of said body in open session to be held next after such advertisement shall be completed, which bids, by said presiding officer, shall be then and there presented to the City Council, to be dealt with and acted on in the mode prescribed by law. Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force from its passage.

It is requested to make two bids—one bid for the present electric lighting plant of the city inclusive of the above franchise, rights and privileges, and one bid for the above franchise, rights and privileges exclusive of the present electric lighting plant. No bidder, however, will be compelled to comply with his bid for the electric lighting plant unless his bid for the above franchise, rights and privileges is also accepted.
