MR. BRYAN'S RECEPTION.

The executive committee, which is in charge of arrangements for a reception to be given to Mr. William J. Bryan at Madison Square Garden, New York, on August 30, made public yesterday a portion of a letter written by Mr. Bryan to Alexander Troup, of New Haven, Ct., the treasurer of the committee, concerning the method of securing funds for the reception. Mr. Bryan wrote, in part, as follows:

"There will be some expense, and the committee must see to it that no money is accepted from questionable sources; in fact, I think it would be well to announce that the expense would be borne by popular subscription, dollar subscriptions being preferable, but that large subscriptions would be received up to \$50, none being received over that. Also announce that subscriptions of \$5, or more than \$5, would be entered in a book and the names given to anyone desiring them. Subscriptions of less than \$5 would not be made known without the expressed consent of the subscriber. Say that the reception will be made as inexpensive as possible, and that any surplus over and above the expenses of the reception will be used to print and circulate the speeches delivered at the reception. I think the publication of the subscriptions is an important thing. The republicans have failed to pass any effective law in regard to campaign contributions, and this will be a good rebuke to them, and will foreshadow the adoption of such a policy by our next campaign committee."

"You can say, if you like that I asked to have this plan adopted." The executive committee held its first meeting yesterday. Alexander Troup was elected treasurer to succeed Nathan Strauss, who was unable to serve. Mr. Bryan's suggestion as to the method of securing funds for the reception was approved and a subcommittee on finance appointed. It was announced that the railroads have agreed to give a half-fare rate, plus \$2, for round trip tickets to New York from all over the country. Mr. Bryan is scheduled to arrive in port on August 29, but he will go aboard a yacht, and will not land until August 30 at 4 p. m., when he will be driven up Broadway to Central Park and back to the Victoria Hotel. A series of receptions are to follow the one at Madison Square Garden. Mr. Bryan's first out-of-town trip will be to New Haven, and, it is said, he will speak from the identical spot where he was interrupted by Y. S. students on one occasion.

MRS. HARTJE ATTACKED.

Mrs. Mary Scott Hartje was attacked yesterday afternoon as she left the courthouse in Pittsburg, after the adjournment of the court by a drunken or insane man, who made his escape in the crowd when she broke away from him and ran to the office of her attorney, John Freeman. She was not injured, but was terribly frightened, and was on the verge of a nervous collapse when she reached the attorney's office. Mrs. Hartje left the courtroom in company with her constant friend and companion, Mrs. Alexander W. Slocum, a neighbor, who has seldom left her side since her trouble began. Outside the courthouse there was a crowd of probably a thousand curious people, most of them gathered just to get a look at the woman who has been followed closely by a Perkins detective on the way to and from the courthouse. This guard was objectionable to her and she asked that it be discontinued. The crowd that has gathered has always been respectful, and no danger was anticipated. So yesterday, at Mrs. Hartje's urgent request, the detective did not follow her. Just as she reached the corner of the courthouse a big fellow, who looked like an ironworker, reached out from the crowd, and catching Mrs. Hartje by the arm, dragged her across the pavement, at the same time calling out loudly, "Come with me, Mary."



The crowd was so paralyzed at the sudden and unexpected attack that not a hand was raised to intercept the man as he dodged through and got away. The man was promptly arrested and taken to Mr. Freeman's office, where Mrs. Hartje had him set at liberty at once by declaring he was not the man.
