BOMBS THROWN FROM CAR.

Two bombs were dropped from the windows of a southbound Third avenue New York elevated train at 8:30 o'clock last night into a crowd of about 200 members of the Associated United Plumbers, Local No. 480, in front of Teutonia Hall, 158 Third avenue. Six union plumbers of Lodge 480 were lacerated, though not seriously, by the explosion of the bombs.

After the smoke or the explosion had cleared away and police reserves from the east Twenty-second street station had arrived on the scene, President William Thompson, of Local 480, sought out Police Captain Hussey, who was making an investigation of the bomb throwing. "I am convinced that a member of Local No. 2 of the Plumbers' Union did the trick," said President Thompson.

Shortly after 8 o'clock last night the members of Local No. 480 began to gather in front of Teutonia Hall on Third avenue near Sixth street, in anticipation of an important meeting of the union, which was to be held there.

President Thompson had met President Frank Gartland, of Local No. 2, the rival union, with whom there had been intermittent warfare for sometime, in the afternoon, and the two had come to a decision on the difference between the two union lodges. It was upon this that President Thompson was to report. The members of Local No. 480 were waiting for the Silverworkers of America Branch No. 1 to vacate Teutonia Hall before going into session.

As a southbound elevated train passed by overhead a black object was seen to fall to the street near the curb and right in the midst of one segment of the crowd of union men. There was a flash and a heavy explosion. Out of the heavy white cloud of smoke three men groped their way to the station door, three others lay prone on the cobbles.

Police Captain Hussey made a search of the vicinity for a possible clue to the perpetrator of the attempted wholesale assassination, but found none. Two men said that they had seen an arm stretched out of the window of the elevated train as it was going past, and had seen the package of bombs dropped. There were two explosions, one following the other almost simultaneously.

Captain Hussey picked up some burnt paper, such as that wrapped about giant torpedoes, but no other fragments of the bomb could be found. He said that it was his belief that corded bombs, steeped in nitroglycerine, such as Italian bomb-thrower's favor, had been the instruments used.

Dowie Deposed.

Judge Landis, of the United States District Court in Chicago, gave his decision yesterday in the controversy between the adherents of John Alexander Dowie and William J. Voliva over the property of Zion City.

The court holds that Zion city and its industries do not belong to Dowie; that while the contributors of the funds did not express a formal declaration of trust, a trust was created, and Dowie had no right to treat the property as his own.

The court refused to appoint Alexander Granger receiver, for the reason that Granger made a vow recognizing Dowie as "a messenger of the Covenant, the prophet foretold by Moses, and Elijah the Restorer," to which vow "all family ties and obligations and all relations to human governments shall be held subordinate." The court said he was not obliged to repose confidence in a man so constituted that, living in this republic, he would serenely vow his readiness at all times to abandon his family and betray his country.

The court ordered an election on the third Tuesday of September of a general overseer, all members of the church residing in Zion City, male and female, to have one vote. He announced that suitable provision would be made for Dowie on account of his services as trustee.

The effect of the decision is to place the industrial affairs of Zion City in the hands of the court, through the agency of John C. Hatley, who was appointed receiver, with bond at \$25,000, while the church's spiritual matters will come under the supervision of the overseer to be elected in September.

Claims against Dowie are now claims against the receiver. The adjudication in the bankruptcy proceedings against Dowie was set aside.

Terrorism in Russia.

Developments indicate that the tide of terrorism has set in strongly in Russia. Eight men were found dead yesterday in the workmen's quarters in St. Petersburg. They had been stabbed or beaten to death. Investigation developed that the men were spies in the employ of the government; that they had been spotted by revolutionists and speedily removed.

Dozens of persons were arrested in Moscow Thursday night while attempting to placard the walls of the city with the address to the people drawn up at Viborg, Fin'land, July 23 by the members of the outlawed parliament.

Strikers in Lodz yesterday burned Woydyslawski's factory, involving a loss of about \$40,000. The estate of M. Falkowski was plundered. The spirit of disorder is abroad. Many small incidents of violence are reported, some of them seemingly merely the result of private vengeance and other robberies by persons pretending to be revolutionists.

Twelve armed men entered a printing office at Yaroslav after midnight Thursday and compelled the compositors to set up and the printers to print 50,000 copies of the parliamentary address to the country, as well as a number of proclamations issued by the socialists.
