NEW RAILROAD RATE LAW.

The new railroad rate law, which applies to all railroads doing an interstate business, went into effect at midnight last night. It will be enforced by the Interstate Commerce Commission. According to the new law, the roads were to have filed with the commission by midnight all their tariffs and charges, showing not only the full cost of transportation from point to point, but also what items go to the making up of this cost. From today on there can be no "extras," but the shipper is expected to be able to obtain in advance a final statement of the charge he has to meet.

The bill applies to oil pipe lines as well as railroads. The Interstate Commerce Commission, which is enlarged to consist of seven members, shall have control of the making of all rates, the fixing of all tariff schedules and the hearing of all complaints bearing on the subject of railroad and pipe line transportation.

If any common carrier disobeys an order of the commission, except for the payment of money, United States courts shall enforce obedience by injunction or other process.

Special agents or examiners empowered to administer oaths and examine witnesses shall be appointed by the commission. Any examiner who divulges any facts or information under such circumstances, except as directed, shall be fined not more than \$5,000 or imprisoned for not more than two years, or both. Whenever common carriers fail to agree upon an order of the commission relative to a division of rates or fares the commission shall settle the question at issue.

Every common carrier must make an annual report to the commission, giving in detail all facts and figures connected with its operation, profits and loss, issuing and sale of stock, rates, salaries paid and moneys collected and disbursed.

For making false entries or destroying or altering the books of a common carrier the guilty person shall be fined not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$5,000, or imprisoned for a term not less than the year nor more than three years, or both.

Upon application of any branch railroad or any shipper, a railroad shall construct and operate on reasonable terms necessary switch connection, and shall furnish cars for the business of such shipper.

Every common carrier shall post conspicuously and file with the commission schedules of rates and fares between points on its own line and on other lines with which it has connection.

For offering, soliciting, giving or accepting rebates or favors the penalty, in addition to a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$20,000, shall also be imprisonment in the penitentiary for not more than two years, at the discretion of the court.

Where railroads offer or shippers accept rebates the offending party shall not only forfeit three times the amount of money received and accepted, but all rebates accepted for six years prior shall be included in the amount. No railroad shall, directly or indirectly, issue any free pass after January 1, 1907, except to its employees and their families or its officers, agents or attorneys at law; to ministers, traveling secretaries of the Railroad Young Men's Christian Association, inmates of hospitals or soldiers' homes, caretakers of live stock and fruit, live men of telegraph companies, postal officials, customs inspectors, train newsboys or witnesses attending suits in which the railroad is interested.

Precedence shall be given to the transportation of troops and material in time of war.

Announcement was made in Omaha, yesterday that Mrs. Cronk Latrop had accepted the beautiful and accomplished son of James Patterson, son of William Patterson, Richmond, Va., who is soon to be married to Mrs. Cronk, a well-known man of Omaha, and former exalted ruler of the Elks. Mrs. Patterson and Mrs. Cronk have been more or less associated in the public mind ever since May 16, 1905, when the woman who was then Cronk's wife, but who has since obtained a divorce from her, seeing Mrs. Patterson boarding a train at Council Bluffs upon which Cronk was going to Virginia to attend the national convention of the Elks, made an attack upon her.

Mrs. Cronk was jealous of Mrs. Patterson because of the attentions Cronk had been paying to the beautiful young divorcee and that jealousy and a well-defined suspicion that Cronk and Mrs. Patterson had prearranged to go East together led to the assault, which was witnessed by hundreds of people, and created a distinct sensation there and elsewhere.

Not long before this incident, Mrs. Patterson had figured in divorce proceedings in the District Court at Omaha.

Flood at Winchester.

For the seventh time in 60 days Winchester was flooded yesterday afternoon, a series of severe rainstorms filling Water, Market and other business and residential streets with water from curb to curb. At many places the sidewalks were entirely submerged, and the water swept over porches and into many of the stores, were hundreds of dollars' damage was done. Electric light and telephone wires were broken by the storm, and communication with Washington and Baltimore was partially interrupted early yesterday afternoon. The streets were impassable last night, and horses harnessed to carriages and heavier vehicles were swept off their feet by the flood. Several persons had narrow escapes from drowning in the streets. Reports received last night from points in the valley as far as Harrisonburg say that the storm has caused heavy floods at many points. The Baltimore and Ohio and Southern Railway tracks have been badly washed.

Battle With Devilfish.

A sworn statement signed by State Treasurer J. W. Robbins, Dr. Goodall Wooten and several other prominent citizens of Austin, Texas, was received yesterday in this city, giving an account of a desperate encounter which they and other men had with a huge devilfish at Arkansas Pass, Tex., three days ago. They were dragged 18 miles to sea by the monster. When the big fish was first seen one of the men in the gasoline launch threw a harpoon into it. The fish at once made for the open sea dragging the launch with it. Efforts to sever the rope holding the harpoon were unsuccessful. A signal of distress was made on another launch and the government life-saving crew went to the rescue. After four hours' battle the fish was killed. It took 30 men to land it upon the beach. It was 25 feet long and eight feet across, and weighed over 3,000 pounds.
