Hearst's Voice Canned.

Arrangements have been made to introduce graphophones and moving pictures into the Hearst campaign. Mr. Hearst has planned personally to appear at least once in all of the larger places in the State, but in the villages and hamlets inaccessible by special trains he will appear automatically.

Between now and election eve the special attraction on every village green will be Mr. Hearst talking through the graphophone and in the background Mr. Hearst in action on canvas. Nothing but high power apparatus will be used. This feature of the campaign was decided on after it became known that the speeches of Mr. Hearst up-State had proved disappointing. The farmers had expected to hear a speech bristling and snapping with all the life of a Hearst editorial and when they got the Hearst speech they realized there was something lacking. They questioned how there could be such a vast difference between Mr. Hearst as a writer and Mr. Hearst as a speaker. It was like Garrick's couplet: Here lies Nolly Goldsmith, for shortness called Noll. Who wrote like an angel and talked like poor Paul.

So to correct this embarrassment as much as possible the graphophone business was inaugurated, and Mr. Hearst has spent much time talking "hot stuff" into a big brass funnel, while his words were being turned into "records" enough to last until election. After that was done the moving picture machine took him in hand, and everything was ready for the performance on the village green.

It was suggested to Mr. Hearst's managers that it might not be a bad idea to have his chief editorial writer talk into the machine, and then while the graphophone was rolling out something that the farmers would listen to they would see Mr. Hearst in action on the canvas, and all would go well. The managers thought it would be better to try the all-Hearst show first and see how it caught on.

Virginia's Debt.

The per capita indebtedness of the State of Virginia, according to figures obtained at the Census Bureau, is being slowly reduced. By per capita indebtedness is meant the per capita share of the public debt of the State. In 1880 the per capita share of this indebtedness was \$30.09. In 1890 the per capita had increased to \$31.54, but in 1902 the per capita had come down to \$25.40. The public debt of the State, includes not only the State debt as the designation is generally applied, but also the county and city indebtedness. The debt of Virginia in 1902, including the debt of the State and the city and county indebtedness amounted to \$48,106,325, of which \$24,171,863 was the debt of the State, represented by State bonds, and \$23,934,462 was the aggregate of counties, cities and towns. These totals are reached by deducting the sinking fund assets from the debts. In 1880 the State debt, including city, town and county indebtedness, aggregated \$45,518,776, which includes the debt represented by State obligations and the debt of minor civil subdivisions. In 1890 the debt had increased to \$52,122,126, but in the succeeding twelve years it was cut down over four millions. The administration of Governor Tyler, from January 1, 1867 to January 1, 1901, was marked by wise handling of the finances of the State, so wise that a deficit or very nearly a deficit in the treasury was changed to a large surplus, after a large sinking fund had been provided.

Both Wives Contented.

Charles R. Sager, twenty-eight years old, his wife, his two small children, and another woman, to whom he was married unlawfully, have been living in the same house in Madison, Wis., since last May, the lawful Mrs. Sager acting as servant in the home of which her rival is mistress. Sager, who is an insurance solicitor and custodian of the buildings of the University of Wisconsin, voluntarily made this confession in court Monday. Every one concerned is contented with this arrangement of their domestic affairs, both women resenting it when the court interfered.

"Charley is a good, kind man, and we shall stick to him through thick and thin," said the second Mrs. Sager, after the man in the case had been sent to jail. "Shan't we, Bessie?" she asked of the first Mrs. Sager.

"We surely will stick by him," said the latter.

"So long as the three persons concerned," said Mrs. Sager No. 2, "are satisfied with this arrangement, I don't think outsiders should interfere and try to make trouble."

Judge Donovan, of the Municipal Court, said that the law must take its course, and that Sager could not be released, at least until an investigation should have been made.

Both of the women are young and attractive in appearance. The first Mrs. Sager is tall and a blonde; the second is short and a brunette.
