Local Matters.

Circuit Court for the County.

[Judge C. E. Nicol presiding.] John Sisco, an Austrian laborer, indicted for an alleged attempted criminal assault upon Mrs. Bessie Welch, was found guilty of assault and battery at a late hour last night by the jury, and sentenced to serve three months in jail, in addition to paying a fine of \$50.

Mrs. Davis's Remains. The remains of Mrs. Jefferson Davis passed through this city this morning at 4:48 o'clock on the way to Richmond. Owing to the early hour and the inclemency of the weather but few people were at the station and the train made but a brief stop here.

Police Court.

[Justice H. B. Eaton presiding.] The following cases were disposed of this morning:

John Payne, colored, arrested by Officer Smith on suspicion of stealing a gun from Mr. Cockrell, in Fairfax county, was held.

Special Officer Woodward, arrested by Officers Lyles and Nicholson charged with assaulting Frederick Brooks, had his case continued until Monday.

Daniel S. Hill, arrested by Officer Young charged with conducting business without a license, was dismissed.

James Dunn, arrested by Officer Garvey charged with drunken and disorderly conduct, was dismissed upon promising to leave the city.

William Gaines, colored, arrested by Special Officer Kennedy charged with trespassing upon cars of the Washington-Southern Railway, was dismissed upon promising to leave the city.

Lawrence Petty, charged with robbing railway cars, and Edward Waters, charged with receiving stolen property, had their cases continued until Monday next.

Albert Green, Wilbur Cook and Edward Maples, charged with robbing cars, were dismissed.

Death of Captain Windsor.

Captain George W. Windsor, an old and well known resident of this city, died at his home, No. 613 South Lee street early last night. He had been in ill health for a long time. Captain Windsor leaves a widow and several children. The deceased had followed the water since he was a small boy, and upon reaching manhood was entrusted with responsible positions on steam and sailing vessels. During the civil war he was employed by the government on steamers that plied between northern and southern ports.

Charged with Assault.

Frederick Brooks, who was assaulted and arrested a few days ago by Special Officer Woodward for trespassing upon Southern Railway property, yesterday swore out a warrant against Woodward charging him with assault. Brooks is an English sailor, and he claims he was on the property of the railway company seeking work as an inspector; that he had a note in his pocket from a railroad official to Mr. Gaines recommending him for employment; that he had previously worked for a railroad at Norfolk; that Woodward, without provocation, assaulted him, beating him over the head with an iron bar. The case will be heard next Monday.

Fined Ten Dollars.

D. Harris, a King street clothier, reported to Officer Roberts yesterday that an oilskin coat had been stolen from his store. The officer later located the coat at a second hand store, where it had been purchased from a white man named Joseph Adams. Later Officers Garvey and Beach arrested Adams. He was brought before Justice Eaton in the Police Court this morning, when the evidence was to the effect that he had sold the coat for fifty cents. Adams in his statement said he gave a colored man a dollar for the garment. The accused was fined \$10.

Funeral.

The funeral of Mrs. Rachael V. Padgett took place from the residence, No. 620 King street, this afternoon. The services were conducted by Rev. C. D. Bulla, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and the interment was in the Union Cemetery.

A charter has been granted to the Tidewater Improvement Company, Incorporated, Richmond. The incorporators are J. B. Miller, president, Sperryville; T. C. Smith, vice-president, Laurel Mills; J. Olinford Miller, Richmond, and C. S. Smith, treasurer, Alexandria. The capital stock is \$50,000.

Death of William Scully.

William Scully, fifty times a millionaire, whose holdings of farm land in the States of Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri cover something over two hundred thousand acres, is dead in London, England, aged eighty-three years.

He became a citizen of the United States in 1900, and resided in Washington, D. C., occupying the John A. Logan house, on Clunnet place, with his family. His first land in this country was bought in Logan, Livingston and Sangamon counties, Illinois, and the remainder is in Kansas and Missouri.

William Scully was born in Tipperary, Ireland, and was the son of Dennis Scully, prominent in the Irish emancipation cause, and the first Irish student in two hundred years to be admitted to Trinity College, Cambridge. William Scully studied law in a Dublin office. Later, upon the passage of the corn law, in 1846, he sold his estate and came to Illinois.

Traveling the country on horseback, he commenced to invest in land, and by urging progressive farming, continued to acquire property to the time of his death. He leaves surviving two sons. The remains will be taken to Washington for burial.

The Scully estate is located in central Illinois, western Missouri, eastern Kansas, and southeastern Nebraska, and comprises the richest farming lands of those sections. They represent the accumulations of fifty years of the life of the dead man, who was the richest farmer in the richest agricultural section of the world.

The deceased resigned his title when Illinois passed the law restricting holdings of aliens. He dressed in green garments and was besieged with fears of poverty and distress, although fifty times a millionaire. He recently married a young wife.

Death of Old Resident.

Emanuel W. Webb, an old and well-known resident of this city, died at his home, northwest corner of Wilkes and Payne streets, about 3 o'clock this morning. The deceased had been in feeble health for some time. Mr. Webb leaves several children. The deceased was born in Bristol, England, but came to Alexandria in early life. He was a gardener by occupation. Previous to the civil war he was a member of the Mount Vernon Guards, and went to Harper's Ferry during the excitement incident to the John Brown raid. Nearly forty years ago he was a member of the night watch of this city, and later when the present police force was organized he became a member of it. He was subsequently sexton of different cemeteries at this city. Mr. Webb was a member of the Friendship Veteran Fire Association.

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
