To Sleep with a Wooden Leg.

The Hamilton County Ohio Board of Elections a day or two ago solemnly advised Harry Ernest, a grocer, to sleep one night with his absent bride's wooden leg in order to gain a residence for election purposes.

Ernest seems to have lost a home when he gained a wife in Oldenburg, Ind., ten days ago. He is an economical German and in order to save expense it has been his habit to sleep under the counter in the rear of his grocery.

When he returned with his bride October 10, he discovered that he had neglected to provide any home for her and since then he has been sleeping in his old place, while his bride takes turns sleeping at the homes of his relatives.

The Ohio election laws provide that a married man's residence shall be wherever his wife's is.

When Ernest went to register so he could vote he found that by marrying he had lost his old grocery residence, and since he had not provided his bride with one he had not gained a new one. His wife's migratory spirit prevented her claiming a relative's home as hers.

The difficulty was solved when the board learned that the bride was blessed with a wooden leg, and advised him that he might register and vote if he would take the wooden leg to bed with him in the rear of his grocery store.

A law for certain cases will, the board thinks, require him to do this only one night in order to make his old residence hers and thereby his own again.

Mitchell vs Gompers.

Behind the report from Indianapolis that Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is thinking of abandoning the stump for this campaign there is a story of discord in that body over the political propaganda which he instituted.

John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers, showed at a recent meeting in Washington of the executive council of the federation his distaste for the way Mr. Gompers was running the political campaign. He was induced to support the policy only after he had exacted from Mr. Gompers a pledge that President Roosevelt would not be assailed by labor speakers. Mr. Mitchell insisted that the President had done more positive work for the good of laboring men than anyone else in the United States. Mr. Gompers feels a resentment, which he has not concealed, against President Roosevelt.

Mr. Mitchell's stand, it is assumed, commanded support from James Duncan, vice president of the federation, and one other member of the council. Among close observers of labor-union politics it is believed that if the elections show that the political policy pursued by Mr. Gompers has fallen to pieces he will have a hard time to be re-elected president of the American Federation, which position he has held for many years.

To Europe by Rail.

The great project of reaching the European countries by rail, with a tunnel under Bering Strait, blooms forth in a corporation which filed its charter in the office of the secretary of state in Trenton, N. J., yesterday. It is the Trans-Alaska-Siberian Railway Company, and it is authorized to issue stock to the amount of \$6,000,000.

The company also proposes to install a telegraph and telephone system connecting these widely diversified sections of the globe by almost instantaneous methods of communication.

The incorporation of the company is said to be the result of a contract entered into by a special commission appointed by Czar Nicholas II of Russia and a representative of the French, Russian and American syndicates in May, 1906.

The main line is to start from Kansk station, of the Trans-Siberian Railway, and to extend easterly to the boundary of the province of Amour, and thence to a point between Yakoutsk and Okotak, thence to the Bering Strait, with various branches to other places, and the tunnel under the strait.

The length of the principal line will be about 2,750 miles, and the branch lines 2,250 miles. The Alaska Railway will start from Cape Prince of Wales, Seward Peninsula, Alaska, at a point known as Kinnegan.

Rescue of Sole Survivor of Crew.

New York, Oct. 25.—When the Danish steamer C. F. Tietjen arrived today from Copenhagen, she had on board one more passenger than when she sailed. His name is Hoek, and is believed to be the sole survivor of the crew of the schooner Oliver S. Barrett, which capsized in a squall on September 14, while bound from Port Royal, S. C., for New York. Hoek was picked up by the Danish steamer Texas bound from New Orleans for Copenhagen, after he had been adrift for 108 hours. His experience was so terrific that his brain became partially deranged. It is believed, however, that he will recover his reason. The Texas hailed the Tietjen in mid-ocean and transferred the shipwrecked seaman to her.

Dead Bride in His Arms.

Leroy McLean, a young electrician, was found in his home, in Harlem, yesterday with the artery on his right wrist severed and bled to death and with the body of his bride in his arms. She had died of heart disease, and he, in a frantic effort to summon help, had jammed his arm through the window glass, ripping the flesh to the bone. Policeman Loneran heard the cries for help and ran up to the McLean apartments. He forced open the door and came upon the young husband, his arm bleeding. On the sofa lay the young wife, her face and hands covered with the blood of her husband, who was bathing her face and begging her to come to life.

"You need treatment, too," said the policeman. "You had better get a doctor. I'll attend to your wife."

The policeman then tore off the strap from his night stick and formed a knot with it about the man's arm.

A physician came from Lebanon Hospital in a short time. One glance at the wife showed him that she was dead. "She died of heart disease over an hour ago," he said.

Will Not Shorten Sermons.

The Central Church South, the leading Methodist Church in Asheville, N. C., was told by Rev. Gilbert T. Rowe, D. D., its pastor, last Sunday night, that he would not cut down his sermon to thirty minutes' duration, as members had requested. He said he intended to suit himself in the matter, and if his congregation did not like it they could get another preacher.

"I have been uncomfortable in my pulpit ever since I have been here because of the requests from members of my congregation for short sermons," he told a crowded meeting in the church Sunday night. Referring to the fact that the Central Church is the best appointment in the conference, Dr. Rowe said he would prefer to have the poorest, rather than not be allowed to preach as he chose.

Dr. Rowe, who was sent to Central Church last fall, is regarded as one of the brightest and most powerful preachers in the South.
