SISTER SHOTS SISTER.

Almost beside herself with jealousy, Mrs. Josephine Kelly, 20 years old, shot and killed her sister, Miss I. Gaff, 19 years old, in the salon of her husband, Francis Kelly, on Mulliken street, Baltimore, about 8 o'clock last night. Mrs. Kelly was arrested by a policeman who was standing near the home at the time and locked up.

Witnesses who were in the room at the time of the shooting say that Mrs. Kelly came to the saloon about 7.45 p. m., and finding Miss Gaff there became engaged in a quarrel with her. It is said that the discussion continued for about 15 minutes, Mrs. Kelly accusing her sister of alienating the affections of her husband. It is further stated that Miss Gaff finally picked up a stick and started toward her sister with it upraised, as if she were going to strike her.

Mrs. Madge Webb and Miss Grace Palmer prevented Miss Gaff from reaching her sister. Then, it is alleged, Mrs. Kelly ran into the saloon and obtaining the pistol from a drawer behind the bar fired through a little window. None of the witnesses was able to say how many shots were fired, but all five of the chambers of the weapon were empty when examined at the station.

It was surmised that no one else was hurt, as there were about six persons in the room, two of whom were a painter and carpenter, who were working in the place.

To Lieutenant Wellener Mrs. Kelly between her sobs made the following statement:

"I was married to Mr. Kelly on the 13th day of last June. Ever since my marriage my sister Ida has been trying to win my husband from me and has told people that she loved him and that she would make him leave me. She was the cause of a separation between my husband and myself which lasted two weeks. He told me that he did not care for her and would forbid her coming to his place. I had been up town making some purchases last night and returned to my husband's place of business about 7:30 o'clock and found my sister in the room back of the saloon. She and I had had several quarrels before, and I was surprised to find her there, since I had on previous occasions ordered her from the place. I took my husband to task and asked him to explain her presence there. He said that she had come up with his sister and not through his solicitation. She became enraged at my objection to her being in the house and started to upbraid and abuse me, saying that she would get him away from me as she did before and that she meant to have him at all hazards. One word brought on another between us and she struck at me. Mrs. Madge Wade, who was in the room at the time, endeavored to prevent her from striking me, and then she picked up a piece of molder and started after me. I ran through the bar and picked up a revolver, which my husband kept behind a drawer, and, totally unaware of what I was doing, fired through the little window in the wall, through which we pass drinks to the dining-room. I did not mean to shoot her, and fired at no definite object. When I saw her fall I was crazed, and don't remember a thing till I was on the way here to the station. I have not the slightest idea how many shots I fired, and had never before fired a pistol. She knew I did not want her near me," continued Mrs. Kelly, "and she has, ever since my marriage to Frank, tried to separate us. She always claimed she loved him and meant to get him. She was the means of separating us once before, and after two weeks I forgave him on his promise to never again have anything to do with her."

Mrs. Kelly was hysterical last night and frequently asked about her sister's condition, not knowing of her death.

Fight with a Mad Dog.

A huge mongrel black and white dog, frothing at the mouth, early yesterday dashed in upon half a dozen men at work in the lively stable of Piercy & Co., west Fifteenth street, New York. Hurling his great bulk against Seth Kelly, one of the stablemen, the ferocious animal fastened his fangs in Kelly's left cheek, bearing the man to the floor. Before the other stablemen could drive off the maddened beast he had succeeded in tearing off nearly the entire side of Kelly's face. A blow from the spoke of a wheel stunned the animal, and he released his hold on Kelly, only to turn upon the others. With pitchforks and heavy brooms, the men worked the attack. Then the dog rushed up to the second floor, where about 50 horses were stabled, and snapping at their legs drove the animals frantic. Tearing loose from their halters, the horses rushed wildly about the place. Telephone calls brought half dozen police reserves and an ambulance. Kelly was taken to a hospital, and the officers, with drawn revolvers, searched the stable for the dog. As Patrolman Lenahan led a horse back to his stall the dog, crouching in a dark corner, leaped at the officer, missing his throat by a hair's breadth. A bullet from Lenahan's revolver stopped a second leap, and the officer emptied his gun into the beast's body. None of the horses was bitten, according to a veterinarian who examined them.

What shall the French government do with the Grotto of Lourdes? Even since the passage of the law separating church from State this problem has puzzled each successive government. M. Clemenceau says he is going to solve it now, though even he hesitates to promise to forbid pilgrimages or to destroy the famous pool. The officials of Paris, incidentally, represent to the government that their community's great prosperity in recent years will instantly crumble should the new law be applied there. The government replied that it can take no notice of such considerations. Nevertheless, it is undoubtedly seeking some way around the difficulty. Those who oppose a continuation of the pilgrimages say the pool is a menace to the community's health, spreading disease with a rapidity which would cause a panic had not special hospitals been established nearby to care for the patients.
