CHRISTMAS MASSES SUPPRESSED

Cardinal Richard, following some of the bishops, has ordered the suppression of all public midnight masses in France. This will make a marked alteration in the customs of the people on Christmas eve. In the ancient See of Rouen this mass has been suppressed only twice before, once during the reign of terror, and when the Prussians occupied the city. The usual Christmas masses are by the cardinal's order suppressed.

The semi-official Paris Temps yesterday said that all signs indicate that it is the P-p's intention to reject the new legislation, adding: "But the government has now nothing to fear. The calm with which the church and State separation law is being applied demonstrates that public opinion recognizes that the government has done and is doing everything humanly possible to insure a continuation of public worship. If in a new injunction the Pope rejects the government's offer, no French Catholic will fail to place the responsibility where it belongs."

A dispatch from Rome says that the Vatican intends to send to the powers a note protesting against the violation of the papal nunciature in Paris, and the expulsion of Mgr. Montaigni. The exact date has not been decided upon, but it certainly will be before December 23. The note will be delivered through the respective diplomatic corps accredited to the Vatican and will be telegraphed to the apostolic delegates, who will communicate it to such governments as may not be represented at Rome. The text of the protest will not be given to the newspapers, but the substance may be published. The Vatican probably will follow the precedent and keep secret the text of the note.

The situation in France, as between the government and the church, is unaltered.

Considerable rioting attended the evacuation of the Episcopal palace and sanctuary at Nantes yesterday. Crowds of Catholic manifestants overcame the police, who were compelled to draw their revolvers and, under threats of opening fire, keep back the mob until rescued by troops. Several women were arrested for striking or biting soldiers. Two girls were arrested for biting policemen. The troops in rescuing the police rode down the manifestants, injuring several of them.

A court-martial at Lille yesterday tried and degraded Capt. Magniez for refusing to obey orders in connection with taking the inventory of the Chapel of St. John Magniez, before the court, said: "I am a Christian, and I prefer to be shot rather than commit a sacrilege. No one has the right to make me renounce the vows I took at my first communion."

THE PRESIDENT'S DEFENSE.

President Roosevelt in a special message to Congress yesterday declared the raid by negro troops at Brownsville, Texas, was "a black and dastardly crime," and cited evidence and precedents in support of his order of dismissal.

He says he ordered the discharge of the negro troops in the exercise of his constitutional power as Commander-in-Chief of the Army.

"The evidence proves conclusively that a number of the soldiers engaged in a deliberate and concerted attack, as cold-blooded as it was cowardly; the purpose being to terrorize the community and to kill or injure men, women and children in their homes and beds or on the streets."

"A blacker crime never stained the annals of our army."
"If any organization of troops in the service, white or black, is guilty of similar conduct in the future, I shall follow precisely the same course. Under no circumstances will I consent to keep in the service bodies of men whom the circumstances show to be a menace to the country."

The discharges, he declares, was not "punished," because the only proper punishment for the crime would be death.

He cites numerous civil war precedents for his order, and points to Robert E. Lee as one of his principal military authorities.

Conductor Accuses Soldiers

Charges have been preferred by a conductor of a train from Pensacola, Fla., to Fort Baranca, alleging that soldiers at that post fired on his car from ambush at 10 o'clock Tuesday night. The conductor avers that on leaving Pensacola for the fort, 10 miles away, he had trouble with an artilleryman about his fare. When he attempted to eject the soldier from the car his comrades rushed to his assistance and one of them threatened the conductor with a club. The street car man drew a revolver and stood off the soldiers, however. The artilleryman who caused the trouble was arrested by the civil authorities.

Reaching Baranca, the soldiers, about 20 in number, alighted. The car stopped 10 minutes at the fort before beginning the return trip. The conductor avers that within a short distance from the post on the return a volley was fired at him. He was on the rear platform and alighted, returning the fire with his revolver. He says his assailants, whom he recognized as soldiers, then fled.

Put Groom Into a Cage.

Joseph Bonner was given the most novel "marriage hazing" on record in Chester, Pa., last night. He was taken from his bride, handcuffed and forced into a wild-animal cage secured from Hargrave's Circus. They, with a band on top of the cage, the vehicle was drawn through the streets of Chester by 30 of Bonner's friends. The affair best any circus parade ever attempted there.

The groom is a member of the Doyle Athletic Club. Shortly after returning from his wedding trip, he was called to the door of his home by the club members. Despite the entreaties of his bride and his own desperate struggles, he was thrust into the cage and the door fastened. The wagon was pulled through all the principal streets of Chester. Bonner kept his temper and was returned to his wife unharmed.
