NO INVITATION.

It is significant of the session of the Grand Camp of Confederate Veterans in Virginia which closed at Norfolk last week that for the first time in the twenty years' history of that body there was before it no invitation in regard to the next place of meeting. When in the order of business the grand commander announced that the time had come for fixing the next place of meeting there was a significant silence. Some one saved an awkward situation by moving that this be referred to the commander and quartermaster to make arrangements for a meeting place and issue a general order.

Legistry from representative men from different parts of the State developed the fact that under present conditions there are very few camps in the State financially able to undertake so complicated a matter as the entertainment of the Grand Camp.

Not only must the camp and neighborhood undertake to look out for the comfort and entertainment of delegates and visiting veterans, a labor of love in most communities, but under the present system a vast army of hangers-on and camp followers have also to be provided for.

The Sons of Veterans have to have their convention, diverting that much of the support and attention from the main camp.

Sponsors and maids of honor must be provided for, chaperoned, entertained and given every attention. And now comes this new organization of Confederate Choires, with their female lieutenant-generals and their military coats, also demanding attention during the session of the grand camp. It is the proverbial last straw, and some camps which have repeatedly invited the Grand Camp to hold its annual session with them have hesitated in renewing the invitation.

Grand Commander Munford has not taken any steps as yet looking to the selection of the next meeting place.

PROHIBITIONISTS VICTORIOUS.

Jefferson county, Ala., in which the city of Birmingham is situated, voted out whisky by a majority approximating 2,000, after a highly exciting campaign. The city of Birmingham gave a majority of 302 against prohibition, but the rest of the county went heavily for it.

A curious feature is that places like Enley and Bessemer, where large iron works are located, and where hundreds of iron workers, supposed to be against prohibition, are employed, went strongly against liquor.

Nearly twelve thousand votes were cast, and the day was marked by spectacular features. Thousands of women and children surged the streets throughout the day carrying aloft placards, shouting their desire for prohibition, singing hymns, and praying. "Jefferson Going Dry," to the tune of "Bringing in the Sheaves," was sung throughout the day. "Bread or Boose" was the placarded query, and "Home or Hell?" "Wife or Whisky" were the warnings from the white ribboners.

The paraders yelled and sang as they marched. Many ministers and business men accompanied them. Later the women gathered at the polling places and served luncheon and coffee as the men voted.

Similar demonstrations on a smaller scale were made at many suburban towns. The weather was ideal. A heavy vote was polled.

The schools were closed, so great was the interest of children in it. Birmingham and Jefferson county are the largest city and county in Alabama, Birmingham having nearly 50,000 population. The prohibitionists will make their next move against liquor in Montgomery.
