## LABOR OFFICIALS ARRAIGNED.

Direct charges that the brawls and sines of the American Federation of Labor are and have been mulcted of hundreds of thousands of dollars by a ring of eleven men, who exercise an automatic sway over two million union working men, will be made in the next issue of American Industries, a publication devoted to the interests of organized labor.

The exposure is based on the proposed action of the convention of the Federation at Norfolk, beginning Nov. 11, when a resolution is to be introduced to the effect that all of the affiliated organizations be urged to levy an assessment of one cent per month per member for one year—which will amount to \$250,000—to carry on a labor fight at Los Angeles.

This fund is to be raised for the alleged benefit of the International Typographical Union and is to be expended under the direction of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation, with the consent and advice of the executive council of the organization.

The American Industries will among other things say:

"In one sense, what the members of the American Federation of Labor do with their funds is their own affair, but since the public has of late taken a deep and abiding interest in the methods of those semi-public officers, who, as heads of great organizations are entrusted with the disbursement of the money of others, it may not come amiss to look briefly at this 'system' of organized labor and the fitness of its officers to handle such a sum of over half a million dollars per year ostensibly in the interest of the working-man."

"The public generally and the members of the affiliated bodies of the federation have a right to know that what money is expended properly and honestly. Eleven men rule unscrupulously the whole body of 2,000,000 union working-men, levy and expend money and accounts therefor practically only in their own lives, since the auditors of their accounts are of their own appointment."

"It is well known that the great 'syndicate' pros at which resulted in sending a delegation of labor men to Washington for the purpose of influencing Speaker Cannon's views on legislation was engineered by Gompers, a part of the delegation being composed of paid labor 'organizers' who, ostensibly working in the interest of organized labor, are in reality employed principally to build up political fences, and thereby to insure the election of the 'ring' and the continuance of the 'system' in power."

"For this work, expenses paid by the rank and file are accounted for in lump sums; these sums vary from \$100 to \$500 a month for services, for which the official rate, authorized by the American Federation of Labor, is \$3.50 a day and expenses. Under this head the work is clearly open for anything that has the sanction of the 'ring' and makes a convenient 'catch-all' for the auditors."

## DEED OF REJECTED LOVER.

Pressing his suit on the girl at a party a week ago he was given emphatically to understand that his love was not returned. That made him desperate.

Dean and several others were always ready to see her home after her day's work was over. ## ATTORNEY ASSAULTS MAGISTRATE.

A lively encounter took place yesterday evening at a meeting of the supervisors of Spotsylvania county, at the county seat between Commonwealth's Attorney Lee J. Graves and Magistrate John Waller.

Mr. Waller was knocked down by Mr. Graves and would have fared badly but for the interference of other members at the meeting. Both parties were placed under arrest and taken before magistrates for a hearing.

While Magistrate Waller was on the stand giving his testimony he made a very insulting remark about Mr. Graves, who picked up a large glass pitcher from a table, throwing it at Mr. Waller, striking him on the head, knocking him from the witness chair and drawing blood. Mr. Waller was fined \$5 and costs and Mr. Graves was dismissed.

It is understood that the trouble arose over a bill presented for payment before the supervisors by Mr. Graves. Mr. Waller claiming it to be fraudulent. Both sides claim that the affair has not been settled and more trouble is feared.
