HIGH SCHOOL LOSERS.

A large crowd from this city, Washington and the surrounding country witnessed the football game between Woodbury Forest and the Episcopal High School teams which was played on the latter's grounds near this city this morning.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

Thomas Whaley, aged 80 years, an employee at the Frith-Stirling Hotel works at Geisboro, was killed this morning. The coat of the unfortunate man was caught in some of the machinery and almost in an instant the end of one of his arms was torn off at the shoulder and his skull fractured and brains spattered on the machinery before he could be stopped.

WASHINGTON JOCKEY CLUB.

With the tracks of the Washington Jockey Club in the best of condition, with entries from stables whose total of 800 horses have overtaken the stallions and mottled of the grounds, and under conditions which augur well for the success of the meeting, autumn racing on the Benning course began today.

RELEASED FROM CUSTODY.

Ten or twelve days ago Officer Knight arrested James Reed on suspicion of stealing a suit of clothes he was endeavoring to dispose of to a second-hand dealer. The clothes were in a new valise. Reed was locked up in the station house, and the police have since been endeavoring to secure evidence against the prisoner, who protested his innocence of theft, averring that the clothing belonged to him. Nothing having been brought upon which Reed could be held, Justice Catton this morning ordered his release.

ARRIVAL OF BARGES.

The tugboat Dauntless arrived at this port yesterday with the barges Patuxent and John T. Donohue, from Norfolk, and barge Maryland, from St. Mary's. The Dauntless proceeded to Washington, and later in the day passed this city with the steamer June Mosely in tow bound for Baltimore, where the Mosely is to be repaired.

DIED FROM HIS INJURY.

Peter Richardson, colored, whose hip was crushed while at work at the Southern Railway round house yesterday, died this morning from his injury.

DISORDERLY SOLDIERS FINED.

Three soldiers who terrorized passengers on an electric car while it was on its way to Mount Vernon last Sunday night were brought before Justice A. J. Payne, at New Alexandria, yesterday afternoon. The justice was a passenger on the train and witnessed the conduct of the soldiers, and being unable to procure the services of a constable, he issued the warrants and made the arrests himself. The soldiers were represented by Messrs. J. M. Johnson and S. P. Fisher, of this city. No one was present to conduct the prosecution, but the captain of the company to which the prisoners belonged was on hand ready to assist Justice Payne. The soldiers pleaded guilty as charged and the three were assessed \$17.50. The captain pronounced another sentence after the magistrate had meted out justice which was to the effect that the men would be put at hard labor during the next thirty days and that \$15 would be deducted from the pay of each.

THE DANCING CLASS.

A radish, grown in Alexandria county, weighing 24 pounds was on exhibition at Aaron Odell's butcher's stall in market this morning.

The police of this city have been requested to look out for a youth named Herbert Kidwell, who recently ran away from his home at Ham's Spring, Alexandria county.

The square on Queen street between Pitt and St. Asaph is being repaved and the curbing set by Mr. Thomas L. Kelly. The work is progressing rapidly and will soon be completed.

Officer Lyles has sufficiently recuperated to resume his duties. He has been assigned to duty in the station house, and Officer Sherwood has taken Officer Lyles' place as patrolman.

Detectives from Washington were here yesterday searching for brass oil cans which had been removed from the steamer Estelle Randall. The cans, it is said, were brought to this city and disposed of.

The supply of country produce in market this morning showed a falling off from the offerings of last Saturday. Eggs sold at 30 cents a dozen and were scarce, but there was no material change in the prices of other articles.
