RIOT AT A FUNERAL. A spectacular riot at a funeral, which resulted in a score of murrers receiving black eyes and bloody noses, the severe beating of a motorman and the breaking up of the funeral procession, occurred yesterday afternoon at Second Avenue and One Hundred and Fifteenth Street, New York. One man, Antonio Barolo, was arrested and held for examination on a charge of larceny.

The funeral was that of Frank Quagliarello, who died a few days ago from a bullet wound, accidentally inflicted. He was a member of a large number of Italian societies, the members of which determined to follow his remains to their last resting place. The hearse was followed by 2,000 Italians in uniform, many of them in carriages, and there was a brass band playing a dirge. At One Hundred and Fifteenth Street a Second Avenue car ran through the funeral procession and so disgraced the alignment that the marchers became furious. Fifty of the infuriated Italians swarmed into the car and severely beat the motorman, Thomas Varley. John Barry, a detective, came to the rescue of the motorman and, with the assistance of the conductor, put up a fight that sent many of the attacking party flying out of the car in a disabed condition. A squad of police arrived on the scene and the riot was stopped. By this time the funeral procession had been completely broken up, and when the hearse finally started again there were but five carriages in the line.

SUICIDE OF YOUNG WOMAN. Made despondent by the belief that she was about to be jilted by the young man with whom she was deeply in love Mrs. Goldie Holbert, a comely grass-widow, about 22 years old, working in the family of Samuel H. Frownfelter, in Hagerstown, Md., committed suicide Wednesday night by inhaling chloroform. She was found dead yesterday morning on the parlor floor. She had not removed any of her clothes, except a jacket, which she wrapped twice around her throat. Her face was covered with a handkerchief that had been saturated with chloroform. Her face was severely burned. An empty two-ounce bottle, containing no label, was still clutched in the hand. A young man who had been paying her marked attention called to see her Wednesday night. He left about 10 o'clock. They quarreled and the girl hastily left the room. She returned carrying a bottle of chloroform. Going to the mirror she placed the bottle to her lips and threatened to drink the contents. The young man persuaded her not to do so and tried to take the bottle from her, but was not successful. Another quarrel arose and the young man left. As he did so Mrs. Holbert told him he would not see her alive again. Frequently of late she threatened to commit suicide. She was a daughter of Jacob Eichelberger, of Two Lock. Some time ago she married a man named Holbert, a farmer, of Clearspring. She ran away from him. Holbert applied to the officers several times to get his wife back, but she refused to live with him.

CHARGED WITH MURDER. Ernest Douglas, a Frenchman, who spoke five languages, and was believed to be of noble birth, did not commit suicide by shooting himself in Baltimore yesterday, as the coroner had certified, but was slain by one of a party of merry-makers who met in his room, and who fled after the tragedy. Douglas had been employed at the Baltimore Country Club, and the Altamont Hotel. He went to Baltimore owing to something in his life abroad that he kept a secret. He said he had a brother in the Papal Guard at Rome, and that his family was rich. When found shot in the head at his room, at 606 North Eutaw street, Coroner Baldwin gave a certificate of death from suicide.

Last night Carrie Snyder called up the police on the telephone and said Douglas had not shot himself, but that he was murdered while a party of men and women were merrymaking in his room, and that she was present at the time. Another woman, John Caulfield and William H. Kabernagle, were also present. She says Douglas and Caulfield were in the room together.
