THEFT OF JEWELRY.

West Virginia detectives are searching for a young woman who is charged, while acting as a governess, with stealing diamonds, jewels, and furs valued at \$10,000 from a wealthy family living at Fairmont, W. Va. The young woman went under the alias of Strong, and is believed to be a professional. The name of the family robbed is withheld by the police.

Friday morning last B. and O. passenger train No. 2 was held up for a few moments at a block tower at Sir John's Run, near Berkeley, to permit another train to pass. As soon as the train stopped a handsomely gowned young woman, who occupied a reservation in the Pullman car hastily left the train, leaving her traveling bag and suitcase in the car. At Sir John's Run she procured a conveyance, and was driven to Berkeley Springs, and later secured another vehicle and was driven to Hancock, where she boarded a Western Maryland train for the east.

Her actions after she left the train led many to believe in both towns that she was demented, but being fashionably dressed, young and good-looking, and seemingly having plenty of money, she was not molested.

She purchased a ticket to New York city, and left it in her traveling bag in the Pullman. The mystery of her sudden departure from the train was solved when Sheriff Hodel received a dispatch to search for her in Cumberland, Md., and at Hancock. Her personal effects were taken to Baltimore by the Pullman officials.

A description of her has been wired to all the big eastern cities. Jennie Weekly, alias Jennie Miller, supposed to be the Strong woman's confederate, was arrested at Adamstown, W. Va., where \$500 worth of jewelry, alleged to have been taken from the late Mrs. Nannie Phillips, of Cumberland, was recovered. Sheriff Hodel says the pair have been working together as domestics.

SHOT DOWN BY A WOMAN.

As was stated in the Gazette, Charles M. Sanford, a lawyer, with offices in the Garfield Building, Brooklyn, and a respected resident of Smithtown Branch, L. I., where he has a wife and family, was shot down in his office yesterday morning by a woman who had been a former client of his and who, it appears, had been seeking him for several years either for a real or a fancied grievance.

The woman who did the shooting gave her name as Jennie Blunt, and when she was arraigned, she told a story of having been drugged and assaulted some years ago after she had gone to consult Sanford in reference to a legal matter. Three weeks ago she had told the same story to the complaint clerk in the same court and had asked for a summons for Sanford. When this was refused to her she told the clerk that she would kill the lawyer, but apparently no attention was paid to this threat.

Sanford, in an ante-mortem statement at the Brooklyn Hospital, told a story quite at variance with that told by the woman. According to the lawyer, she had complained to him some years ago of having been ruined by another man, and had him bring a case against this man. When this case fell through she had been annoying him ever since, Sanford said.

It was learned yesterday that the woman in February, 1906, had brought a charge in a Brooklyn police court against a young man named Schnitzler. Sanford acted as her lawyer in this case. Schnitzler was subsequently taken before the Supreme Court on a writ of habeas corpus and discharged. Sanford's condition is critical.

ALLEGED CRUELTY OF FATHER

Alleging that a drunken father snatched his 10-months-old boy from the mother's arm and dashed the little one into a blazing fire, where its feet were burned off before it could be rescued, is the charge brought against John Lambeth, of Morning Star, Princess Anne county, in a warrant sworn out by the Norfolk Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. The man and his wife were arrested Monday in Atlantic City, where they have been living since leaving Morning Star, about three weeks ago, having been driven from Princess Anne county, it is charged, by a magistrate. It is claimed that during a drunken brawl Lambeth became enraged because his wife would not lay the child down and prepare a meal for him, and, taking the infant from Mrs. Lambeth, deliberately threw it into the fireplace, where the little legs were horribly burned before the mother could rescue her offspring.
