PRINCE DE SAGAN AND MME. GOULD.

Some little progress was made yesterday in the French-American wooing, when the Prince de Sagan left his apartments in the Waldorf-Astoria, New York, for luncheon with Mr. and Mrs. Tyler-Morse, at the St. Regis, and spent the afternoon there in company with Mm. Gould.

Whether the lovers considered between themselves the advisability of returning to Europe at once or of staying on a few days more in the hope that a final appeal to George Gould to sanction the marriage would be successful could not be learned. The report that they would be married within a month, in America, if George Gould consented, and in Europe if he did not, however, was confirmed. At 6 o'clock the whole party, consisting of the Prince de Sagan, Mm. Gould, Mr. and Mrs. Tyler-Morse, Isador Morse and a couple of friends, then drove over to the Hotel Gotham in three of the Moreses' machines, where they had dinner.

It was said yesterday that the unamiable attitude of her family is causing Mm. Gould much distress. Not only is George Gould reported to have absolutely refused to consent to the marriage, but Helen Gould, at whose house Mm. Gould is stopping, has also indicated her displeasure so strongly that the relations between the two sisters have become quite formal. Partly as a result of this family opposition the Prince has seen Mm. Gould only three times since his arrival in America.

SHOOTING THREE WOMEN.

George Eells, aged 60 years, shot and instantly killed Mrs. Mary Andreas, a neighbor, in the lower section of Philadelphia, last night, and probably fatally injured Ella Pasenall, his alleged common-law wife, and Kate Jewel, a niece of Mrs. Andreas. Domestic troubles are said to have been responsible for the tragedy. Eells is a policeman with a record of 23 years' continuous service.

Mrs. E. Eells, or Miss Pasenall, claimed recently that E. E. had treated her cruelly, and a few days ago she left the house and went to stay with Mrs. Andreas. Eells did not like the interference in his domestic affairs, and is alleged to have declared he would clean out the Andreas house.

When his wife came out of the Andreas's house last night Eells, who had apparently awaited an opportunity, drew a revolver and shot her in the head, inflicting what the physicians say will prove a fatal wound. Mrs. Andreas came out of the house when she heard the shot and received a bullet in the head from the irate man's revolver. She was killed instantly.

Kate Jewel, who also came upon the scene, attempted to escape, but was shot in the back of the head. It is said that she will also die. Eells was arrested immediately after the shooting by a brother officer. He said he was not sorry for what he had done.

KILLED BY HIS BROTHER.

Charles Wickliffe, one of the members of the notorious gang of Cherokee Indian outlaws long sought by the officers, was shot and killed at the Wickliffe home, in the Spavinaw, Cherokee Nation, Saturday, by his brother Thomas, the result of a family quarrel.

The Wickliffes were three in number, Thomas, Charles and John. They were full-blooded Cherokees and were considered the most desperate gang of outlaws that has infested the southwest in years. Many murders are laid to them, and they were particularly sought for their attack near Kanasa, Okla., on Sunday, March 11, 1905, upon a number of deputies who were attempting their arrest for murdering an officer.

The deputies overtook the trio in the fastnesses of Spavinaw county, a wild, mountainous district in the heart of the Cherokee Nation. A fierce battle ensued. Deputy Marshall Ike Gistrip, of Vinita, an officer with a noted record, was killed and the outlaws escaped. The whole territory was aroused and for several weeks armed posses from all directions sought them.
