### RACE TRACK INVESTMENTS.

Those persons interested in horse-racing in New York State have called attention to the fact that many millions of dollars are involved in the issue now before the legislature of that State. The following statistics have been prepared and presented to members of the legislature in order that they may count the cost of abolishing racing: Estimated selling value of real estate holdings of the Coney Island Jockey Club, Brooklyn Jockey Club, Brighton Beach Racing Association, Queens County Jockey Club, Metropolitan Jockey Club, West Chester Racing Association and Empire City Racing Association \$4,800,000; racing associations now taxed on \$2,400,000 in realty holdings; estimated number of breeders affected, including all states raising thoroughbreds, 3,000; estimated value of their property, including realty holdings, buildings and horses, \$75,000,000; estimated number of employes dependent upon breeding farms for livelihood, 25,000; stables in training for 1908, 1500; value of animals and property (estimated) \$20,000,000; number of employes, (estimated) 15,000; disbursements annually by racing stables in Metropolitan Circuit for feed and farmers' supplies, \$9,000,000; employes of local racing associations, 2,000; employes of caterers to local associations, 500; bookmakers and employes (estimated), 3,000; annual expenditures in New York City and vicinity by patrons of racing, excluding all sums employed in making wagers (estimated), \$25,000,000; amount paid annually for railroad fares (minimum estimate), \$400,000; train crews to be unemployed by withdrawal of service (estimated) ten daily; probable depreciation of values, should the bills have the effect predicted, not less than fifty per cent. within a year; loss to small merchants, whose livelihood depends upon race track patronage, estimated at \$1,000,000; loss to Sheephead Bay, Gray and Brighton for maintenance of owners, trainers and stable employes, annually, \$500,000. In the above no effort is made to compute the possible loss at Saratoga.

### SHAH FEARS FOR HIS GEMS.

The Shah of Persia, the Light of the Orient, has taken extraordinary precautions to safeguard his wonderful collections of jewels, estimated to be worth \$85,000,000.

Some American travelers in Teheran were indiscreet enough to talk openly about the wonderful treasures hidden in the Shah's vaults. The frank Americans were wondering, admiring, not conspiring. But being Americans, their conversation was reported to His Majesty, who was seized with the notion that there was a plot on foot to rob him of his jewels.

Immediately he had deeper and even more secure vaults dug. The iron doors of the passages leading to the vaults have ingenious electrical contrivances which, when set, not only will send an alarm to the Palace Guard, but will discharge explosive enough to destroy an army of robbers. Night and day a score of picked men guard the jewel vaults—cruel, ruthless mountaineers, who await only the order to kill.

The Shah's greatest treasure is a sword, the hilt and scabbard of which are encrusted with diamonds, worth \$1,500,000. The imperial crown contains a ruby which is regarded as the finest in the world. Such a one could not be bought for \$750,000.

### HAS TWO WIVES LIVING.

Henry Cook, a hotel man, confessed in the Hustings Court of Richmond yesterday morning to being the husband of two living women. On account of his age and infirmity, the man was given only three years in the penitentiary. After listening to the confession of the man, Mr. Mae J. Conn, his first wife, collapsed in her chair. Cook also faint-ed when the court pronounced judgment. Cook was married to Miss Conn on August 16, 1905. He was subsequently married to Miss Lucile G. Early at Elizabeth City, N. C., on October 31, 1907. The last wife displayed no emotion. Both women appeared as witnesses for the commonwealth.

Henry Cook formerly lived in this city where he had many friends.

### HIGH PRICED PROPERTY.

The commissioners of the District of Columbia value the land and improvements in that section of the city from 3rd street to 15th street and from Pennsylvania avenue northwest to B street southwest at "about \$19,300,000." This estimate, made by the commissioners, was included in a report made to Vice President Fairbanks in response to the Senate resolution of February 21 directing the commissioners to report the price of land and all improvements within the boundaries mentioned. This territory, because of its location, has been strongly advocated as the site for an extension of the Mall upon which to erect a number of government buildings, and its purchase is provided for in the Heyburn bill now pending in Congress.

He makes no disguise of them, and within the last month, during his illness, it was well known that Baroness Vaughan was living in the royal palace in the guise of a nurse. She has now returned to her chateau near Paris.

The king unquestionably is a wreck. He walks as if he had locomotor ataxia, and he is so feeble that the slightest cold confines him to his bed.

### SEIZED A THOUSAND DOLLARS.

While Michael E. Hogan was standing in the public banking room of the Mercantile Trust Company in St. Louis Monday, Frank Sellick, of New York, a bookmaker's sheet-writer, is charged, suddenly seized a roll of \$1,000 from Hogan's overcoat pocket and ran, pushing aside men and women who stood in his path. He was captured on the steps of the bank, it is charged, while attempting to pass the money to a confederate. The confederate fled before the money reached his hands, and the crowd captured the money-snatcher. Sellick was fashionably attired and was wearing a number of diamonds. He had plenty of money in his pockets. Superintendent John Shea, of the Burlington Bureau, identified the prisoner as Kid Burke, alias Fisher, known to the police of every large city in the United States and in Paris and London. Several pictures of Burke were found in the rogues' gallery. Mr. Hogan is president and principal owner of the bank at Alamont, Ill.
