TO THE OWNERS OF DOGS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
Alexandria, Va., June 6, 1908.

All persons owning or intending to keep any animal of the dog or canine species should come forward on or before
JUNE TWENTY-FIFTH, 1908,
and take out a license for the same from the Auditor. After the 30th of June all persons owning or harboring dogs without the required license are subject to a fine as the laws on the subject require of \$5 or \$5.

Complaint has been frequently made that many persons fail to take out their license, and that others pay on one or two dogs when owning and harboring more, or who send such dogs away during the summer months and bring them back in the fall.

Attention has been called to this evasion of the law, and policemen will report all such cases, and fines can be imposed upon those who fail to take out licenses after trial in the Police Court.

In order to avoid any mistakes persons who make application for licenses should do well to write their names and number of residence, street, etc., on a card or paper when making application for their licenses to the Auditor.

Attention is also called to the fact that while the payment of a license tax is required by the laws of the city whether a dog is kept on the premises of the owner at all times or not, yet the payment of such tax does not entitle the dog to the unrestricted use of the streets and alleys of the city, both day and night, for it is provided by law that "The Mayor in addition at any and all times, in his discretion, by proclamation shall declare that all such dogs as above licensed shall be securely muzzled, and if any such dogs be found running at large during the continuance of such proclamation without the required muzzle they shall be seized by the police force, or other persons designated by the Mayor for such purposes, and conveyed to a suitable place and destroyed."

The following is a copy of Section 54 of the License Law: "On every dog, regardless of sex, one dollar and fifty cents."

DEMAND ON CHINA.

The French government has decided not only to exact the punishment of the Chinese implicated in the killing recently on the Indo-Chinese border of six native soldiers and a French officer, but will demand material and moral reparation, including the dismissal of the viceroy of Yunnan province. The French minister at Peking, M. Bapsi, has been instructed to present the French demands to the foreign board.

A dispatch received in Peking yesterday afternoon from the governor of Indo-China says he has been advised that Chinese regulars have pillaged the tongking village of China. Further demands will be formulated on this account.

In the absence of the viceroy of Yunnan province the provincial treasurer has presented to the French consul at Yunnan the excuses of the Chinese government for the killing recently of six native soldiers and a French lieutenant on the frontier by Chinese regulars while they were disarming Chinese revolutionists who has taken refuge on French territory. Furthermore the treasurer promises that exemplary punishment will be meted out to the guilty soldiers. The French consul at Yunnan is making a personal investigation in the occurrence.

DREAMED OF BURIED WEALTH

For a week past Thomas Wade, a prosperous farmer in Tuckahoe district, Henrico county, dreamed each night of a buried box bulging with gold in ingots and ancient coins. The spot where this treasure was secreted was indicated invariably in his dreams by an old stamp, which he recognized as being on his farm.

At first he paid no attention to the dream, but its persistence finally convinced him that he was about to become a millionaire. On Monday, with the assistance of Constable I. H. Henley, he went to the place indicated in his dream, and after digging for several hours, his shovel struck the traditional "hard metallic substance."

Believing his dream of wealth realized Wade fainted from emotion, but the constable nursed him back to consciousness, and then the box was unearthed and examined. It contained three big copper cents of ancient date and four fish-hooks.

WIDOW RETURNS FORTUNE

Bonds valued at \$125,000 have been recovered by the receiver of the Albany National Bank, at Pittsburg, Pa. They were surrendered by Mrs. Frank Lee, who was to have married William Montgomery, cashier of the defunct bank.

The widow gave Montgomery \$10,000 from her husband's life insurance to invest for her. He gave her bonds of the Pittsburg Brewing Company to the amount of \$125,000, telling her he had made that much money in speculation with her money.

The bonds, it turns out, were taken by Montgomery from the bank and worthless paper was left in their place. All the collateral in the bank was rehypothecated by Montgomery, and the receiver is intent on getting a large amount of it back.

Mrs. Leesaid she thought Montgomery had really invested the money for her and had no idea it had been stolen.

TURNER'S INSURRECTION.

Mrs. Martha Caroline Neimeyer, widow of Henry V. Neimeyer, died at her home, in Portsmouth, yesterday morning in her eighty-fourth year.

During Nat Turner's insurrection in Southampton county, in 1831, the slaves, under the fanatical leadership of Nat Turner, a negro preacher, murdered a number of people. The sister and a number of other relatives of the deceased were among the victims. Mrs. Neimeyer was then a small child, and her life was saved by the warning of faithful slaves who gave notice of the approach of the murderers and assisted in secreting the family in the woods, where they were hidden for two nights until the danger was past.

Mrs. Neimeyer was the daughter of John T. Vaughan, of Bonnie Doon, Southampton county, and was married to the late Henry V. Neimeyer, of Portsmouth, 60 years ago.

Steele claims that he walked in his sleep and was unconscious of what he was doing. He is unmarried, about 25 years old and well connected.
