OFFICIAL NOTICE TO GAS CONSUMERS.

Gas bills for the quarter ending June 1, 1908, having been delivered, this is to notify all customers that the usual discount will be allowed on all bills paid on or before July 1, 1908. To City Taxpayers--Notice.

Collector's Office, June 17, 1908.
Notice is hereby given that the tax bills for 1908 are now in the hands of the Collector. The attention of parties interested is respectfully called to the following extract from the revenue bill of that year:
"Upon all bills paid in full by the last day of July, 1908, the Collector of Taxes shall allow a discount of ten per cent, and on all bills paid by the last day of September, 1908, he shall allow a discount of five per cent, and on all bills not paid on the last day of December, 1908, there shall be assessed and collected a penalty of five per cent upon the amount of said bills, and on all bills remaining unpaid on the last day of June, 1909, damages at the rate of six per centum per annum shall be paid."
Taxpayers would do well to call and pay at once in order to avoid the rush and crowd usually present on the last days in which the discount is allowed.
Bring a list to make sure you get bills for all your property, as the Collector will not be responsible or allow the discount after the time fixed by law. F. F. GORMAN, Collector of City Taxes.

LOSS OF THE BRAZILIAN CONTRACT.

"Because the labor unions want to see a skilled workman teach his trade to his own son is the reason the United Ship lost the \$50,000,000 contract for ships for the Brazilian navy," said Rear Admiral George W. Melvin, in Philadelphia, yesterday.

"We have the best steel and iron in the world right here. We have the timber, which England must import, but because the labor unions have put their restriction on the number of apprentices skilled labor has become so scarce in the United States that it costs 40 per cent more to build a ship in America than it does in Great Britain or Germany."

"In some cases no apprentices are tolerated as such a pay large sums to labor unions."

"No greater travesty on American freedom exists than this robbing of the young American of his birthright to work at the trade he chooses. Nothing to my mind is so un-American as to deprive a boy of his right to learn a trade, or a man of his right to teach it. Nothing is so dangerous to our manufacturing supremacy."

"To this pernicious practice of limiting and restricting apprenticeship I attribute the loss of this great contract. The labor unions want to raise wages by reducing the number of workmen. They have succeeded, but Samuel Gompers and his allies have constructed a boomerang which has come back and hit labor at a very inopportune time. During this period of financial depression a \$50,000,000 contract would have been a great boon to the American mechanics."

"I see a future for this country similar to that of Spain and Italy. There the trade guilds in the towns became so strong and domineering that the nobility could not invest its capital."

"What should the United States do to make sure of the next ship contract from Chile, or Peru, or Argentina? Every State should pass a law prohibiting the restrictions by trade unions of the number of apprentices, and the United States government, should admit all skilled workmen. Then we will become the ship-building country of the world, because we have the steel, the timber, the men of brawn, and the men of brains."

There is a lot of gossiping and prophesying about the final outcome of the race for gubernatorial honors in the coming campaign, but there has not been even a murmur concerning some of the other fit places to be filled.

While it is believed that Judge Williams, of Wythe county, will again oppose General Anderson for the attorney generalship, the judge has not come forward as yet with a flat statement to that effect. It will be remembered that during the last two campaigns Judge Williams has made futile stabs at the scalp of the general, but they saw fit to send General Anderson back to his job.

Hon. James B. Oston, of Alexandria, will be a candidate for lieutenant governor, now held by J. Taylor Elyson. While Mr. Elyson has made no public statement to the effect that he would be a candidate to succeed himself, it is believed that he will.

It is believed that the following elective officers will stand to succeed themselves: D. Q. Eggleston, jr., secretary of the commonwealth; A. W. Harman, jr., treasurer; J. D. Eggleston, jr., superintendent of public instruction, and George W. Koinor, commissioner of agriculture.

STABBED TO DEATH.

Charles Jones, aged eighteen, son of Asa Jones, a prominent lumber man, was stabbed to death near Sylva, N. C., Thursday, by Basil Watson, aged twenty-three, son of James Watson. The tragedy was the result of a quarrel about a young woman with whom both were in love. There had been several quarrels between the men over their love affair. Jones was stabbed in the abdomen and diaphragm. He died in fifteen minutes while a physician was dressing his wounds. Watson fled over the State line into the mountains of South Carolina, but a long distance telephone message last night from Webster, N. C., says Watson has surrendered himself to the sheriff there and was in jail. Watson says that Jones made an assault upon him, and that he killed Jones in self-defense.
