CASE COMPROMISED.

The will contest case of the heirs of Samuel Beach against Annie E. Cranford came up in the Circuit Court for this city today before Judge J. B. T. Thornton. The object of the suit was to break the will of the late John S. Beach, for many years clerk of the Corporation Court. The deceased left his estate, valued at about \$25,000, to his two sons, Lucy and Helen C. Cranford, both of whom have since died. Before their death, however, his nephews and nieces brought suit to set aside the will, which suit has been pending for some time. Today a compromise was reached and a jury, by agreement, brought in a verdict sustaining the validity of the will. The basis of the compromise was not made public.

Later in the day Samuel M. Ansell and others entered suit against Annie E. Cranford and others, beneficiaries under the will of the late John S. Beach, to set aside a certain deed for property conveyed by Lucy and Helen C. Cranford to N. S. Greenaway, trustee, on the ground that Lucy and Helen C. Cranford were not competent to make a deed. This brings another issue into the case.

ANXIOUS PARENTS.

As was stated in the Gazette, the remains of the unknown youth who was struck by an engine and killed near Spring Park last Sunday night were yesterday turned over to the coroner of Alexandria county and in the afternoon the interment took place.

Since the finding of the body and the publication of all that could be learned concerning the unfortunate boy discharges and letters have been received in this city asking for descriptions of the dead youth.

Chief Goods, of the police force, yesterday afternoon received a telegram from O. A. Black, Charlotte, N. C., asking for a description of the dead boy. A telephone message was also received last night from Danville, giving a description of a lad missing from that city. It did not, however, tally with the description of the dead boy.

Chief Goods this morning received a letter from Mrs. E. A. Lindsey, of Richmond, asking for a description of the unfortunate youth.

CIDER AND VINEGAR COMPANY.

The Seemee-Board Cider and Vinegar Company, which recently took charge of the large brick building at the northeast corner of Prince and Union streets, is placing the structure in order for the purpose of the company. Concrete floors are being laid and other improvements made. The company expect to occupy the premises in about two weeks. The entire building will be utilized, and the Norfolk and Washington Steamboat Company, which now occupy the east front, will construct an office on their wharf at the foot of Prince street. The Seemee-Board Company will employ about 50 persons. Champagne cider and vinegar will be manufactured and the output will be about 400 barrels in 24 hours. It is the intention of the company to expand the plant in the near future.

RUNAWAY HORSE.

The horse attached to a wagon belonging to Mr. J. W. Gaines, of Fairfax county, ran away on King street yesterday afternoon. Mr. Gaines' twelve-year-old son was seated in the vehicle at the time, and while the horse was rushing madly through the street the youngster was endeavoring to reach the bridge in order to bring it to a stop. When the runaway reached the intersection of King and Columbus streets the wagon collided with a buggy in which a colored woman was seated. The buggy was considerably damaged, and the occupant painfully injured. At this juncture young Gaines managed to get on the horse's back from which position he secured the bridle and stopped the runaway.

WOMAN CAUSES EXCITEMENT.

Considerable excitement was caused in the vicinity of Royal street station of the electric railway last night by a woman whose husband was in the company of another female, whom, it was said, he was about to accompany to Washington. The neglected wife was bitter in her denunciation of her rival and equally positive in upbraiding her husband. Among other things she said one of her children was dangerously ill and liable to be dead by morning. The husband allowed his companion to proceed to Washington alone. A card from the man in the case appears elsewhere in the Gazette.

The case may go to the jury this evening.

PARDONED.

Gov. Swanson has pardoned Harry Smith, who was sentenced by the Corporation Court of this city to serve one year in jail. Smith was convicted at the March term of the court. He had been arrested on the charge of being a party to the larceny of a hog belonging to James Patterson. Smith is said to be in ill-health. The theft of the hog occurred a short distance from this city, and the plunder was carried to a shop near the union depot, the proprietor of which purchased it. He, too, was arrested and sentenced to a term in jail.
