## APPEAL TURNED DOWN.

Messrs. S. H. Haysborough, Robert M. Ward and N. T. Bartoe, a subcommittee of the general committee appointed at a mass meeting held by the business men of Winchester, to protest against the order of the Virginia Corporation Commission requiring through service by the Southern Railway over the lines of the Baltimore and Ohio, and the Southern, from Lexington, to Alexandria, via Strasburg; and also against the more recent action of the commission refusing application of the Baltimore and Ohio for an order permitting it to establish a through schedule of trains from Lexington, via Strasburg and Winchester as far as the state line, have submitted their case to the commission.

In their petition the representatives of Winchester say:

"We respectfully represent that the city and citizens of Winchester, Va., feel that in granting the privileges, or requiring this through service over both lines of those two railroads from Lexington, Va., to Alexandria, Va., our citizens are being discriminated against to their serious disadvantage.

"The effect of these orders, as they stand, is manifestly to force the travel and business of the upper valley in one favored direction, that is to say, to the town of Alexandria, or rather through the town of Alexandria and thence northward, and to divert it from its natural channel through the Valley of Virginia, via Strasburg and Winchester.

"Our citizens earnestly insist that they should be offered, at least, an equal opportunity to secure to this section of the State the advantages of this travel and business which, by the orders complained of, seems to be taken away from them and turned unnaturally into another channel.

"If the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company is willing or can lawfully be required to inaugurate a through schedule from Lexington via Strasburg, Winchester, to its northern connections, it would certainly seem that the right to do so should not be denied.

"Both the interests of the company and the interests of the community, for which it is the chief carrier, combine in asking a change of the orders complained of, in this respect.

"We think therefore, that to the order of January 23, 1908, this supplement should be made: 'That what is known as the passenger, baggage and express transfer at Strasburg Junction should be discontinued and a through schedule between Lexington, Va., and the Virginia and West Virginia State line, via Strasburg Junction (but not to interfere with the existing order requiring all trains of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company to run into Strasburg) and Winchester shall be inaugurated by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company as soon as practicable and not less than 60 days from the date of this order.'

Judge Francis, of the commission, has notified the committee that the complaint is not specific enough.

## POLICEMAN KILLED.

Policeman George T. Smith, early last night, was shot to death in the heart of the business district by Capt. J. W. Jarratt, of Nurney, Va., section-master on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad. Smith had been on the police force for many years. He was 57 years old and leaves a family.

Jarratt had been arrested about midday for intoxication by Policemen Smith and Dennis. He was shortly afterward admitted to jail by Mayor Norfleet. According to the police Jarratt made threats against Smith's life. He borrowed a pistol and then hunted for Smith, it is alleged. As Smith returned to his beat from supper Jarratt opened fire at close range before Smith could draw his pistol.

Jarratt was hurried to the police station. Within a few minutes a crowd of 2,000 persons gathered, and there were threats of lynching.

Jarratt has been with the Atlantic Coast Line for many years and bore a good reputation. He is an Odd Fellow, as was his victim.

## GIRL PLUNGES TO DEATH.

Mrs. Stella Parker, a nineteen-year-old girl known to the public as Madeleine Novl, was fatally injured late Friday afternoon while "hooping the gap" in an automobile near Pittsburg, where she had been the attraction for two weeks.

Madeleine Novl was advertised to turn three complete somersaults in her car after running down a steep incline. Friday afternoon one of the rear wheels of the car slipped from the track. When the car struck the gap it lurched over on its side, turned three and a half somersaults, and then came down with a crash. The girl's head struck an iron bar to which she was holding, crushing her skull.

A panic followed the accident, many women fainting. Her manager said he knew nothing about her, but her name and address were found on an identification card around her neck, probably

## STRANGE LIGHTS IN THE SKY.

Dispatches from Berlin say that remarkable lights were observed in the northern heavens on Tuesday and Wednesday nights, the bright diffused white and yellow illumination continuing throughout the night, until it disappeared at dawn. Director Archenhold, of the Trepow observatory, says that because of the phenomena's particular brilliancy he thinks it may be connected with important changes on the sun's surface, causing electrical discharges.

Director Archenhold, however, mentions a somewhat similar phenomenon in 1833, which was directly traceable to an outbreak of the Krakatoa volcano, in the Straits of Sunda. Reports from Copenhagen and Koenigsberg tell of the same great lights being visible in those cities, and it is presumed that they were visible throughout northern Europe.

## TRADESMEN'S THREAT.

Bathers, bakers and other tradesmen who minister to the wants of the 400 at Newport, R. I., are tired of waiting for their bills and have formed an association to attach some of the million-dollar homes of their rich debtors unless settlement is made. Thirty days is to be allowed the rich cottagers, and falling payment by that time sheriff's attachments will be put on properties, as was done a few days ago on the estate of a lady, a society leader, who forgot her butcher too long. Rumors of the action to be taken have been rife for some days and have been sufficient to force settlement of some long standing accounts. In some cases those remittances have been made by cable.
