BLOODHOUNDS GET CLUE

The police at Portsmouth believe that the slayer of Policeman Wintzinger either escaped from that section yesterday morning on board an early freight train on the Atlantic Coast Line or the Southern Railway, or is now hiding in the Pig Point section, opposite Newport News. After a vigorous search of the Shear farm, near Pinner's Point, they are convinced that the fugitive had been in that vicinity, and they believe that they have in their possession his handkerchief, from which he had tried to wash the blood stains.

Early yesterday morning the police were notified by Mail Carrier Kellan that he had seen a suspicious negro who answered the description of the murderer on the Shear farm and a detective took the bloodhounds that have been used on the case and went immediately to the farm.

The dogs took the trail within five minutes and were shortly in full cry, plunging through the bushes and undergrowth. They ran along the creek for some distance and the officers followed as closely as they could. Suddenly the hounds stopped and began baying over some object on the ground. The officers rushed up and found one of the dogs with a blood-stained handkerchief. The dogs followed the apparently still warm trail across the railway tracks, through a negro settlement and toward Pinner's Point, where it was lost.

Coast Line and Southern Railway points have been notified, and the police of every settlement contiguous to these roads are on the lookout for the murderer. A large posse of officers and a med citizen went to Pig Point last night with the hope of finding the fugitive there.

CIGARETTE IN A SUICIDE'S MOUTH.

Calvin T. Cropper, 21 years old, son of Thomas J. Cropper, committed suicide at his home, at Ocean City, Md., late last night, by blowing his brains out with a pistol. Family troubles had been preying on Mr. Cropper's mind for some time, and for a month or more he had threatened to put an end to his life.

Last night he went driving with a young lady, to whom he was paying much attention, and who had been a chum of his since school days, and told her he was going to kill himself, but she only laughed at his threat, and believed he would soon get over his despondent mood.

On their return home Mr. Cropper, passing his mother and brother, who were sitting on the porch, went to his room and locked the door. A second later a shot was heard, and the brother rushed up stairs, broke in the door and found Calvin lying on the bed, pistol in hand, with his coat off and a cigarette in his mouth, and blood flowing from the gaping wound in his temple.

Dr. Townsend and Baggett were immediately summoned, but death followed in a few moments. Mr. Cropper was well known and much liked in Ocean City, and had complete charge of the ice plant of his father. He was very sensitive, and had many disagreements with his father.
