## WANTED TO DIE.

Elgar Allen Poe, at his best, never imagined a more horrible story than was calmly told yesterday afternoon on the witness stand at the inquest on the death of Dr. Frederick T. Rustin, the Omaha surgeon, who was found dying on his porch at Omaha, Neb., one week ago last night with a bullet through his body.

The story was of the people, all wanting to die, one because of his inability to provide for his wife and children and, further, because of his infatuation for a woman of the streets; the second, a woman, Mrs. Abbie Rice, anxious and willing to die, because of love for the doctor, and the third, a rich young man, Charlie Davis, wanting to die because of insomnia.

The denouement in the Rustin mystery came yesterday afternoon when Mrs. Rice took the witness stand to tell her relations with Dr. Rustin. After detailing their infatuation for each other the woman told of Dr. Rustin's intention to die, but that he hesitated to commit suicide, for then, his family could not secure the benefits of his life insurance policies.

He then, according to the woman, made a suicide compact with her, in which she was to shoot him and then kill herself. But after several attempts, each time of which her nerve failed her, Rustin told her not to trouble herself, that he had found another fellow who wanted to die and that in return for enough drugs to kill himself the fellow stood ready to shoot Rustin.

## ATTEMPT TO KILL CHARGED.

Herbert Hutchinson, a young man of Portsmouth, was in Mayor Reed's court in Norfolk yesterday charged with attempting to kill Charles Cherry, another young man. He also tried to kill himself.

Hutchinson had been paying attention to Miss Alice Cherry, a sister of Charles Cherry. This was objectionable to Charles, and it is alleged that he warned Hutchinson to discontinue his visits. Monday night in the absence of Cherry, Hutchinson called on Miss Cherry, and with her was sitting on the porch of a friend as Cherry returned home at a late hour. It is alleged that Cherry then threatened to kill Hutchinson, and that Hutchinson pulled a revolver and commenced firing. Three shots fired at Cherry went wide. Hutchinson then turned the muzzle of the weapon toward himself and fired the two remaining bullets from the pistol, but these also missed the mark.

Hutchinson was released on bail yesterday in the sum of \$500, his father, W. F. Hutchinson, going as his surety.

## ASKED PASTOR TO RESIGN.

Because Rev. Philip Elsom preached a sermon on the text: "Thou shalt not commit adultery," the congregation of the Fayetteville, Baptist Church, at Raleigh, N. C., has been torn into factions, and the pastor has been asked to resign and leave the city. The sermon was delivered last Sunday and words were not minced. Some of the references to certain people were so broad as to be unmistakable. Many of the things said by the preacher cannot be printed. The sermon is generally described as grossly vulgar. During the discourse many of the members of the congregation left the church, and they were so indignant that there was talk of handling the preacher roughly.



## TO COLONIZE SOUTHERN MARYLAND.

A conference between Assistant Freight Agent Stikens, of Philadelphia, and interests of Baltimore was held yesterday in the offices of the Pennsylvania Railroad, at Calvert and Baltimore streets, with a

view to colonizing about 10,000 acres of land along the Pennsylvania Railroad in Charles and Prince Georges counties with foreigners. No particulars were given out in regard to the details of the proposition, but Secretary Trappe, of the State Immigration Bureau, has been called on for help in supplying information concerning the qualities made by the immigrants for farms. It is understood that the plan will be to cut the big tract up into small farms suitable for trucking, and that German, Norwegian and Dutch immigrants will be given the preference.
