ANOTHER SHOOTING SCRAPE.

Yesterday with a twist it was passed has but the following happened by carrying too long at the wine did not end with the setting of the sun on that day. IN NEED OF A FERRY.

Thousands of dollars are lost annually to the merchant of this city on account of improper facilities of travel between this city and Maryland. Since the Washington poor house has been established in the vicinity of Shepherds about 200 families have located just opposite this city. NEW TRIBE OF RED MEN.

The meeting held last night in the office of N. C. and Bothe, on south Fairfax street, for the purpose of taking final action in the matter of organizing another tribe of the Improved Order of Red Men, was well attended and much enthusiasm was manifested in the movement by those present. It was unanimously decided that application be made at once to the proper Great Chiefs of the State, through Great Junior Segmores W. S. Nicklin, of this city, for dispensation to institute the tribe some time in the early part of October. The new tribe will be composed of some of the most influential and best known citizens and it is fair to believe a great factor in the fraternal societies of Alexandria. The order throughout the entire country has been making wonderful progress in recent years. There are many causes for its phenomenal increase in numbers and influence. The order has intrinsic merit as a society which teaches and exemplifies its principles of friendship and brotherly helpfulness. Its precepts inspire all with the spirit of fraternal love and good fellowship and the divine idea of the brotherhood of man. Its teachings tend to refine the nature of its members to enable their characters, and awaken their minds to the highest aspirations. And it can be truthfully said that it has few equals in the care of the sick and afflicted of the tribes, and in its ministrations to the needs of their widows and orphans. It welcomes all white male citizens of sterling worth into its fraternal bonds of freedom, friendship and charity—the three cardinal virtues of the order. CIRCUIT COURT FOR COUNTY.

[Judge J. B. T. Thornton, presiding.] A grand jury, after the Gazette's report closed yesterday, investigated the escape of Richard McGuire and Samuel Hines, both negroes, from the county jail September 1, after assaulting Jailer Harry Crack. The jury recommended in its report that all prisoners be kept in cells and closely guarded, and not be permitted to leave the jail without a guard and that they should not be given the freedom of the grounds; that some changes be made in the doors of the jail etc., and stated that some degree of censure is due the jailor for allowing the prisoners to escape. Four indictments for assault and highway robbery were found against Samuel Hines, colored. Robert Lee, colored, for attempting to wreck an Old Dominion and Great Falls electric car, case set for trial September 10. Charles McCoy, colored, robbing A. M. Roberts, of The Plains, Fauquier county, sentenced to serve three and one-half years in the penitentiary. Lucy Banks, colored, grand larceny, sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary. James Dorsey, colored, petit larceny, sentenced to serve two months in the county jail. The case of Benjamin Carter, colored, charged with car breaking and larceny, was continued until October 1. Court adjourned till Thursday.

DANGEROUS CROSSING.

People who have to travel on the telegraph road are loud in their complaint about Cameron Run crossing which is on the Washington-Southern and the Southern Railway. A watchman is stationed there up to 6 o'clock in the afternoon and afterward no one looks out for the safety of travelers. There are seven railroad tracks at the point and two or three trains crosses the point every two or three minutes. It is a fact, too, that more people travel over the crossing after 6 o'clock than before. In the last few years there have been several narrow escapes from death at the point. Frank Nevitt was killed at the crossing, George Sims was badly hurt, and Peter Pulman's team struck twice and demolished. What is needed is an overhead bridge and until this is built a watchman should be kept there every night. It is said that the railroads have signified their willingness to construct their share of a bridge, but Fairfax county is unwilling at this time to commence the work.
