DEMOCRATIC MEETING.

Tonight at 8 o'clock there will be a meeting of the Bryan, Kern and Carlin Club at Sarepta Hall. A subcommittee consisting of Messrs. R. D. Brumback, S. P. Fisher, E. E. Lawler and R. S. Barrett was appointed by President S. G. Brent yesterday to formulate rules for the government of the club.

SUPPOSED THIEF.

Detective Cole, of the Fourth Precinct of Washington, who has been at work on the various cases of theft which have occurred at Potomac yards, yesterday came to this city and secured the services of Officer Sampson from police headquarters, and the two arrested Ike Gibson, colored, on suspicion of being the thief. A coat answering the description of one of the articles stolen was found in his possession.

A NEW STREET.

While in the city yesterday Mr. Duke, of the Washington Southern Railway, held a conference with Superintendent Dove of his road and Messrs. Wedderburn and Slaymaker of the Monument Association in relation to straightening the line of their property and the railroad and of opening a street from King street extended to the Duke street bridge. Mr. Dove was requested to ratify the survey made by Engineer Howell and also submit an estimate of the cost of opening said street which will add greatly to the convenience of the people and the beauty of the park.

POLICE COURT.

[Justice H. B. Caton presiding.] The following cases were disposed of this morning: Two men, charged with racing horses in the streets, were dismissed. William Phillips, charged with stealing a horse and buggy belonging to Chas. Elliott, was sent on to the grand jury.

THE MARKET.

There was an abundance of seasonal produce in market this morning, but prices of most articles were unchanged. Butter was selling at 25 and 30 cents per pound. Eggs were still firm at 28 cents a dozen. Tomatoes were plentiful at 60 cents a box. Apples, pears, peaches and other fruit were in abundance. Most of the better varieties brought good prices.

THE AIRSHIP.

Orville Wright established a fourth world's record with his aeroplane yesterday afternoon at Fort Myer, when he remained aloft for 1 hour, 10 minutes, and 26 seconds. He was the same modest and unassuming gentleman as before when he alighted and received the congratulations of the army officers and other friends who were gathered to witness the flight.

AN ATTEMPTED HOLD UP.

Ed. Wells and his brother, of Fairfax county, hired a team from a livery stable Thursday night to go to a dance at the home of Mr. Edward Tyler, about three miles from Manassas. Oscar Powell, Jr., a Manassas negro, was engaged to drive the team. While at the dance Mr. Wells became intoxicated, and in the first scene of Powell exhibited a roll of bills. After leaving the scene of the dance at an early hour on Monday morning, and proceeding a short distance toward Manassas, Powell stopped the horse and, drawing a revolver, jumped out of the vehicle and demanded Wells to hand over his roll. Instead of doing so Wells sprang from the wagon and grappled with Powell, and in the struggle which ensued Wells was shot, the ball taking effect in the right leg above the knee, making a very painful though not a dangerous wound. After firing the shot Powell made his escape, and has not yet been apprehended.

HELD FOR THE GRAND JURY.

George Powell, colored, who was arrested near the Gum Springs camp meeting grounds, in Fairfax county, about two weeks ago and fined \$20 and costs for selling liquor without a license, was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner R. W. Garnett this morning to answer a charge of violating the internal revenue laws. After an examination Powell was held to await the action of the U. S. grand jury and committed to jail till he could furnish bail in the sum of \$200.

MAN KNOCKED DOWN.

A young man was knocked down at the corner of Princess and Lee streets last night by four soldiers who were camping with the cavalry on the fair grounds. The young man reported the facts to the station house and an officer was sent to arrest the offenders, but they had escaped. But for the arrival of another young man the soldiers would have beaten him badly, it is thought.

BRYAN TO SPEAK AT ANNAPOLIS.

Hon. W. J. Bryan will speak from the Capitol steps at Annapolis, Md., on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. A special train to carry about 40 Alexandrians who want to hear him will leave this city about midday of Tuesday. It will be decorated with flags and bunting.
