**THE MALONEY DIVORCE.**  
 Helen Maloney, daughter of the  
 wealthy Papi Marquis Martin Maloney,  
 of Philadelphia, was granted a final de-  
 cree annulling her marriage to Herbert  
 Osborne of New York. The decree was  
 granted by Justice Gerard in the Su-  
 preme Court of New York on the ap-  
 plication of Miss Maloney's attorney. Miss  
 Maloney was married to Osborne by a  
 justice of the peace in Mamaroneck about  
 two years ago, but subsequently re-  
 mained at home with her parents in  
 Philadelphia until she eloped with  
 Samuel Clarkson to Canada, whence the  
 couple went to England.  
 Fear that she might be compelled by  
 her parents to marry a titled foreigner  
 whom she disliked, was the reason which  
 Helen Maloney declared impelled her to  
 go through a marriage ceremony with  
 Osborne, a young broker. The foreigner,  
 whose name is not given, was a constant  
 visitor to the Maloney home in the fall  
 of 1905 and the spring of 1906.  
 This information, given by Miss Ma-  
 loney under oath when she was being  
 examined by a referee in connection with  
 her application to have the purported  
 marriage annulled, was gleaned from  
 papers in the case, which were filed in  
 court after a formal decree finally annul-  
 ling the marriage was granted yesterday.  
 It has been rumored, that Miss Ma-  
 loney will marry Clarkson, with whom  
 she eloped after civil ceremony bound  
 her to Osborne, but a dispensation will  
 be necessary. She never acknowledged  
 her husband.

**SUICIDES.**  
 There has been an epidemic of sui-  
 cidal drownings in Halifax county with-  
 in the last two years.  
 A man living near Mount Laurel  
 ended his life in Staunton river two  
 years ago. A woman soon thereafter  
 did likewise in Bannister river. Still  
 later another woman was found dead  
 from cold and fatigue in efforts to reach  
 Staunton river.  
 Last comes the death several days ago  
 of Mrs. William J. Powell, a young  
 mother, who, leaving her baby asleep,  
 wandered off in the night, while her  
 husband was sleeping in another room,  
 and cast herself into the water. The  
 motive prompting her to the rash act  
 will probably never be known. She  
 was apparently happy and was in a fair  
 state of convalescence.

**NARROW ESCAPE.**  
 Repeated demands for \$3,000 and ig-  
 noring as many threatening letters from  
 members of the Black Hand, Nicholas  
 Volante, an Italian barber, living in  
 apartments over a grocery store on Fitz-  
 water street, Philadelphia, with his  
 wife and young son, was saved from what  
 would undoubtedly have been a terrible  
 death for himself and family when a next  
 door neighbor stamped out a lighted fuse  
 to a large dynamite bomb in the doorway  
 of Volante's home early today. The  
 bomb, now in the hands of the police,  
 contained enough dynamite to have blown  
 up the entire block. It was fourteen  
 inches long and four inches in diameter,  
 being wrapped in wax paper, and had  
 four fuses attached.

**WOMAN IS SHOT DEAD.**  
 W. H. Tilley, a well-to-do farmer,  
 living three miles from Durham, N. C.,  
 shot and killed his wife Monday night  
 and yesterday the coroner's jury held  
 him without bail on a charge of murder.  
 Tilley's story is that he snapped a Win-  
 chester rifle at a dog twice, and failures  
 to fire made him "break" the gun. When  
 he tried it the third time he struck the  
 breech, and it fired into his wife's head,  
 killing her almost instantly. He alarmed  
 the neighborhood, and physicians from  
 Durham went out. Sheriff Har-  
 ward went immediately to the scene and  
 arrested the man.  
 Mrs. Tilley often complained of her  
 husband's threats against her life, and  
 her little son said yesterday that they  
 quarreled in the afternoon after Tilley  
 had whipped him.

**SHERIFF GETS THE GIRL.**  
 William Larmore, sheriff of Wicomico  
 county, Md., yesterday morning rushed to  
 the wharf with pistol in hand and de-  
 manded that two men in a boat, then  
 30 yards from the wharf, return at once  
 and surrender to him Miss Frances  
 Jones. Miss Jones brought serious  
 charges against J. Denison last April,  
 when a preliminary hearing was given  
 him before Justice John Phillips. Den-  
 son was released under bond, and the  
 girl also gave bond to appear as a wit-  
 ness.  
 Court will convene in Wicomico county  
 on the 27th, and the case will come up.  
 The object of the men in taking the  
 girl away was to keep her on Holland's  
 island until after adjournment of court,  
 but Sheriff Larmore defeated their plans  
 and now has the girl at his own home,  
 where she will remain until court con-  
 vene.

**FIRE IN BALTIMORE.**  
 McCoy Hall, Johns Hopkins Univer-  
 sity, Baltimore, was badly damaged by  
 fire last night, which broke out in the  
 north end of the building on the  
 fifth floor. Archeological specimens  
 of priceless worth, antiques which never  
 can be replaced, valuable old manu-  
 scripts of ancient civilizations which  
 were accumulated in years of research,  
 thousands of scientific volumes on almost  
 every subject taught at the institution  
 and periodicals in almost every modern  
 language were a prey to the flames.  
 In addition to this almost incalculable  
 loss, there were over 30,000 volumes in  
 the academic library which were badly  
 damaged by the water which leaked  
 through from the fifth floor, to which  
 the blaze was confined, and it will take  
 many thousands of dollars to repair this  
 damage. The damage to the building  
 was probably \$50,000, although no accu-  
 rate estimate can be had for some days  
 until experts go over the premises.
