In deciding the case of Ber a College against the State of Kentucky favorably to the State, the United States Supreme Court yesterday held that a State of the union may constitutionally legislate to prevent the coeducation of the white and black races. The case was instituted to test the validity of the State law of 1904, prohibiting white and black children from attending the same schools. The higher court took the position that the white and black races are naturally antagonistic, and that the enforced separation of the children of the two is in line with the preservation of the peace. The opinion of the Supreme Court was handed down by Justice Brewer, but affirmed the finding of both the Kentucky circuit court and the court of appeals. Justices Harlan and Day dissented. Justice Brewer's opinion dealt entirely with corporations as affected by the Kentucky statute, and did not consider the question of its applicability to individuals. Contending that it would prove impracticable and unwise to separate corporations from private schools, Justice Harlan, in his dissenting opinion, said the court should meet the entire question squarely and decide whether it is a crime under any conditions to educate white children and negro children at the same institution. He did not concede that it should be so regarded. "Have we," he asked, "become so impregnated with prejudice of race that an American government, professing to be based on the principles of freedom, and charged with the protection of all citizens alike, can make distinctions between such citizens in the matter of their voluntary association for innocent purposes, simply because of their respective races? "Further, if the lower court be right then a State may make it a crime for white and colored persons to frequent the same market places at the same time or appear in an assemblage of citizens convened to consider questions of a public or political nature, in which all citizens, without regard to race, are equally interested. "Many other illustrations might be given to show the mischievous, not to say cruel, character of the statute in question and how inconsistent such legislation is with the great principle of the equality of citizens before the law. "Justice Harlan added that he did not want to be understood as criticizing the system of separate public schools for the races, but that his dissent was directed at the penal provision of the Kentucky law involved in this case.
