TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—A man named S. A. Trauer, W. S. M. Kinnon died a his home in Ashabula, O. to a enlargement of the heart, after a long illness.

On his way to Monterey, Mexico, at Dallas, Texas, last night, Mr. Bryan was given an ovation. Hundreds of shouting democrats crowded the passenger station. He said he couldn't explain the defeat of the party, but he was investigating and when found he would tell the public.

Deserted Wife's Charges.

Boston, Nov. 17.—The story told by the wife he is alleged to have deserted in Boston is true. "The Rev. Payson Young" rector of the fashionable Episcopalian Church of St. Mary the Virgin in San Francisco, is really Patrick J. Lyons, formerly a Boston fish clerk.

Young's name has figured in newspapers all over the country recently through his connection with the disappearance of Miss Ella Clarke, a pretty Alameda art student, who was yesterday reported to have been seen in the city of San Francisco.

Mrs. Mary E. Lyons, of east Boston, today identified a photograph of the San Francisco rector as that of her missing husband. Since he deserted her and her three children she says he has traveled in various parts of the country. Although but 44 and posing on the coast as a single man, Young, or Lyons, is a grandfather. Mrs. Lyons says he was born here and for several years was employed as a clerk in a fish store in this city.

Lyons was still under 30 when his manner and fluent speech attracted the attention of a prominent merchant and in 1892, without a college degree or theological education he was ordained to the ministry. The deserted wife exhibits a copy of his ordination certificate.

On September 19, 1895, says Mrs. Lyons, her husband went out one evening and never came back. She declares that a wealthy married woman of his church had prepared to accompany him, but Lyons left, taking the money the woman had given him for their expenses and leaving her behind.
