MR. FINLEY AT SPARTANBURG.
 In celebration of the building of the Carolins, Clinchfield and Ohio Railroad from Elkhorn, Ky., to Spartanburg, S. C., a banquet was given Friday night by the Chamber of Commerce, at which were present many prominent railway and public men.

Responding to the toast "Our Railroads," President Finley of the Southern said to the representatives of commercial, industrial and agricultural interests that they were as much concerned in the healthy advancement of railways and good highways as those who have money invested in the stocks and bonds of the transportation companies. He demonstrated with force that a commercial center cannot thrive unless the railroads are progressive and that the farmer, therefore, has a contemporaneous interest in the health of both. In this connection, he said:

"Destroy the transportation facilities of such an industrial center and it will die; restrict them and it will cease to grow, in either event not only the town itself but also the agricultural community surrounding it will suffer."

That the railroads and a community are dependent upon each other was declared by Mr. Finley, who made a strong point of the reciprocal obligations. He closed with a discussion of the propriety of railroads engaging in politics, on which subject he said:

"Whether or not such participation in political affairs was ever justifiable, it is no longer. Your railways are out of politics, but their property, their business and their ability properly to discharge their service to the public are subject to political action. This places upon you the obligation and responsibility of seeing to it that their conformity to higher and better standards does not result in their oppression."

WOMAN KILLED INTRUDER.

Mrs. Rosie B. Davis, a handsome young widow, last night shot W. L. Tillery, a leading business man living near Dublin, Ga., inflicting wounds from which her assailant died in a few hours. The tragedy occurred at the home of Mrs. Davis, in the suburbs of Dublin.

According to Mrs. Davis, she was alone and heard some one knock about 9 o'clock. Going to the door she peeped out and saw a man, whom she did not recognize as Tillery.

He demanded admittance and was refused. He then said he would break in. Mrs. Davis went to her room and seized a pistol. By this time the man had broken through the screen door and rushed at Mrs. Davis. She warned him. He seized her in his arms, she said, and as he did so she fired, the bullet striking him near the heart. The man fell, and neighbors who came rushing in found that he was Tillery. But they say he was disguised so as to be almost unrecognizable.

Tillery was removed to his home and physicians were called. He refused to make a statement but his friends say he was crazy. This theory is scouted, as Mrs. Davis declared his purpose was criminal.

Mrs. Davis is young, beautiful, and wealthy, and is prominent socially. Her husband had been dead about eight months. Tillery has a family and has always been prominent in business and social circles.

Public sympathy is with Mrs. Davis, and it is not thought she will be prosecuted.

COLLISION IN FOG.

As the result of a misunderstood train order and a heavy fog extra southbound freight No. 903 and the first section of No. 274, also a freight, crashed together early yesterday morning in a head-on collision on the Atlantic Coast Line near Nausemond station, 8 miles from Suffolk.

Front brakeman H. K. Snovel, of West Philadelphia, was buried in the wreckage and incinerated; Engineer W. J. Buchanan, of the northbound train, also was entombed, being cut out barely in time to save him from cremation, and other trainmen, who jumped, were more or less injured.

Both engines and 21 heavenly laden cars, carrying cotton, peanuts, and lumber, were demolished. The debris immediately took fire. An engine from the Suffolk fire department was carried to the scene on a special train, but practically everything, save car wheels and castings, was consumed before water could be had from a near-by branch.

The trains had orders to meet at Nausemond. Engineer W. P. Bicks, of No. 903, misread his order to designate Nausemond siding as the meeting place. The thick fog prevented the engineers from sighting their danger until the trains were upon each other.

Killed by Automobile.

New York, Nov. 23.—Almost in front of the gate leading to Rockwood Hall, the estate of William Rockefeller, at Tarrytown, the bodies of two men, both residents of Tarrytown, were found by a milkman while on his route early this morning. The theory is that the men were killed by a speeding automobile late last night, the car never stopping to see what damage had been done. The men were William Arthur Purdy, fifty-five years of age, a plumber, of Tarrytown, and William Kramer, forty-five years old, also of Tarrytown.
