REWARD FOR MINISTER.

A dispatch from Port Huron, Mich., says that by means of two false teeth it was definitely established yesterday afternoon that Gideon Browning, of Adair village, was the man who was butchered last Tuesday evening in the little "Battle Run" Methodist Church, in Columbus township. With part of the mystery which has enshrouded the brutal crime thus cleared, the supervisors of St. Clair county immediately offered a reward of \$500 for the arrest of Rev. John H. Carmichael, of Adair, pastor of the little church, and the man who was at first supposed to have been killed, dismembered and then buried in the church stove.

The teeth which identified the dead man were found when the ashes from the stove were sifted. Dr. C. H. Browner, of St. Clair, the dentist who made Browning a set of false teeth recently, examined them again more thoroughly, and decided that they blackened relics were part of Browning's set.

His decision satisfied Prosecuting Attorney Brown that it was Browning who had been killed and the supervisors immediately offered the reward for Carmichael's arrest and sent broadcast detailed descriptions of the minister.

Strenuous efforts to discover some motive for the description of the carpenter by the minister were fruitless. Rumors that Carmichael had been seen crossing the St. Clair river into Canada could not be corroborated. An officer sent to St. Thomas Out., reported no trace of him there.

Mrs. Carmichael and Miss Carmichael, wife and daughter of the minister, were examined yesterday by the prosecuting attorney at Port Huron and he stated afterward that he was convinced that they knew nothing of the murder, nor the man's disappearance. A statement yesterday by Mrs. Carmichael that her husband's sister is an inmate of an insane asylum in West Virginia may explain some of the horrible features of the crime, if the authorities, suspicious about Rev. Carmichael are borne out. Mrs. Carmichael also said that her husband was moody and restless the night of his disappearance and apparently brooding over something.

It was also learned yesterday that on Monday, the day before the murder, Rev. Carmichael came to the postoffice apparently much agitated and perturbed and received a letter, which he took away without opening. It is thought that this letter may have had some connection with the strange intimacy which had been noticed for a number of weeks before their joint disappearance and the crime in the church.

But the motive and Rev. Carmichael's whereabouts are still a complete mystery.

C. P. TAFT LEAVES CHURCH.

Charles P. Taft has severed his connection with the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, at Cincinnati, as a result of a letter written by the pastor, Rev. R. L. Watson, during the national political campaign. In his letter of resignation Mr. Taft also asked to be released as one of those guaranteeing the salary of the pastor, Rev. Robert L. Watson.

The action of Charles P. Taft was the outgrowth of estrangement between himself and Dr. Watson, which had its origin in a personal letter written to a Chicago minister by Rev. Mr. Watson some time previous to the presidential election, in which the latter expressed regret at the liberal religious views of the presidential candidate, William H. Taft. A copy of the letter was later sent by a Chicago man, into whose hands it fell, to Charles P. Taft.

About a month ago Mrs. C. P. Taft withdrew her letter from the Church of the Covenant, of which she had long been a prominent member.

YOUNG WOMAN ILL TREATED.

A girl thought to be Daisy Thaw, of Paterson, N. J., was found at A'entown, Pa., Thursday night, thinly clad, with the exception of a white sweater, stiff with the cold and asleep on a door step. She told a strange story of having left New York for an automobile ride with a party of friends.

A. Bethelheim, she stated, she had been given wine from a bottle and almost immediately had become unconscious. She was taken to the county hospital at Weecoville, where she is being cared for. Her condition is serious, and frequently she lapses into unconsciousness, as the result of her treatment and the exposure, the temperature when she was found being near zero.

The girl stated that she was employed in a 5 and 10 cent store in New York city. On Thursday she had a day off, and upon the invitation of three men to take an automobile ride through Pennsylvania went along with them.
