SHOOT FATHER-IN-LAW

Denied the privilege of seeing his wife and child, from whom he has been separated, Lee Long shot his father-in-law yesterday afternoon at Selbyville, Del., and was shot in the head by Hudson in his own defense. Hudson was rushed to the Jefferson Hospital, in Philadelphia, in the hope of saving his life while Long was conducted to Georgetown and placed in the county jail.

Long has been separated from his wife for several months and has made a number of attempts to see her at the home of her father, Constable Elisha Hudson. Yesterday afternoon he was walking by the Hudson home, when his two-year-old boy came out and spoke to him. The father picked the child up, when Hudson appeared and ordered him to leave. Long at once became enraged and alleges that Hudson started to get his gun when he fired two shots first, hitting Hudson both times in the back. Hudson was still able to reach his gun and fired in return, the lead going wide, but a few of the shot struck Long in the head and neck. There has been ill-feeling between the two men for some time, as Long was about to bring a suit against his wife for a divorce on a alleged misconduct.

MURDER OF YOUNG WOMAN.

Attired in the gown purchased as her bridal dress, the body of Leona Luppens, the 18-year-old dining-room girl of the Hotel Henry at McDonald, near Pittsburg, Pa., was found Saturday night tied to the railroad tracks 100 yards west of Primrose station. There were no marks on the body, and to all appearances she had been killed at some distant place and the body had been placed on the track to be mutilated by a train.

Until last Christmas Miss Luppens, who is the daughter of a French miner, was keeping company with a young man of McDonald. They had planned to be married Wednesday of next week, and on Saturday the young woman went to Pittsburg and purchased a traveling gown in which she was to have appeared at the wedding and which she wore Sunday morning. The young man to whom she was to have been married is said to have disappeared Saturday afternoon, and the police have received instructions to look for him.

According to Ellen Williams, another waitress at the Hotel Henry, the Luppens girl came to her early Saturday evening and, giving Miss Williams the key to her trunk, said that she was going to elope, requesting Miss Williams to take care of the trunk until after the marriage.

After her duties in the dining room Saturday night, Miss Luppens went to her room, dressed and went out. That was about 7:15. Two hours later E. T. Crew, of Primrose, found her dead.

Mrs. Paul Schaffer, wife of the proprietor of Hotel Henry, declared that for the last two days the girl had appeared to be downcast, and that when asked to give a reason for her distracted manner declared that she had some trouble with her fiancé.

ANTHEM STOPS PANIC.

The singing of "America" stopped a panic yesterday at the High School Auditorium, in York, Pa., where more than 3,000 people had assembled to hear William J. Bryan deliver his famous address, "The Prince of Peace."

The auditorium was crowded and thousands had congregated on the outside clamoring for admittance. When the hour scheduled for the Nebraskaan's address arrived some indiscreet person threw open the main doors and there was a rush for the inside, which was already filled to its capacity. Women were knocked down and their clothes torn, while others were injured.

Mayor Weaver, who was seated on the rostrum, appealed to the crowd to cease pushing and be calm. This, however, failed to quiet them. H. A. Bully, secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., called upon the nearest him to sing "America." Instantly the national anthem was caught up and sung by nearly everyone in the audience, including those who were fighting their way into the auditorium. The police on duty took advantage of this lull and drove the crowd back and locked the doors.

Mr. Bryan was the guest yesterday of Jere S. Black. He consented to deliver an address at the request of Mr. Black, who was acting for the Young Men's Democratic Society. He prefaced his address by stating that he was more interested in religion than politics. He said that he would continue to make political speeches, however, as long as there was sufficient provocation, and that he was provoked every time he read a republican speech. The speaker said that religion is a reality, not superstition. He spoke of the great moral awakening that is sweeping the country and argued against the Darwinian theory.

RIOT PREVENTED.

It required the presence of an armed squad of 100 men from the cavalry station and a patrol wagon full of policemen, armed with riot guns, to prevent a bloody clash between several hundred sailors and a big gang of Berkeley, Va., negroes near the training station, late Saturday night. The display of force quieted the sailors, who had marched away from the training station with the avowed intention of driving every negro out of Berkeley.

The incipient race war was caused by a fight that occurred in A. Zedd's saloon, on Liberty street. Four apprentice seamen went into the bar and became involved in a row with a gang of 12 or more negroes. During the fight one of the sailors was hurled through a glass door and badly cut. The disturbance was quelled and the four sailors went to the training station. There they told of the affair and the bloody clothes of the wounded man increased his mates.

The word was passed along and at 7:30 o'clock 700 men marched toward Zedd's place to wipe it off the map and drive the negroes out of Berkeley. There has been ill-feeling between the blacks and the sailors for a long time and the latter were ready for a fight which would have been bloody had not the soldiers and police appeared.
