THE ALEXANDRIA HOSPITAL
To the Board of Lady Managers:
Ladies: By the passing of another year opportunity is afforded for another quarterly report. Since my last service there has been taken from amongst us Miss Eliza Smith, one of the staunch veterans of the hospital and for many years a member and president of the Board of Managers.
A woman mentally gifted way above the average. Surrounded from the time of infancy to mature years by an atmosphere pregnant with religious doctrine when she reached adulthood and throughout her active life the whole tenor of her being led to the elevation of the afflicted and the reclaiming of the fallen.
My service just completed has been the most pleasant during the past years. The general trend of the hospital has been toward a better improvement. The three months just passed have been strenuous ones for our worthy matron. There were a number of very sick patients, the responsibility and work was heavy, but she was equal to the occasion, being physically in better trim. Occasionally she dons her fighting cap which is her safety valve for too much pent up Scotch energy.
When I come to comment upon the work of our nurses I am forcibly reminded of the experience of an old Alexandrian, who a number of years after he had ventured for the third time in matrimony was asked by a benedict what his experience had been. Said he, my first ventura was good, my second better, but my third was best of all. So our worthy matron is to be congratulated upon her wise selection of nurses. While we have always had been good some years they have been better; but these are collectively the best nurses the hospital has ever had.

FATHER ELBERT'S CASE.
Further investigation into the affairs of Father Caspar P. Elbert, the priest who was removed by Cardinal Gibbons from the pastorate of St. Katherine's Catholic Church, Baltimore, because of his financial entanglements, indicates that his losses may possibly exceed \$130,000, the first figure mentioned. Agents of Cardinal Gibbons are making a thorough investigation, and it has been ascertained that the priest lost the money in backing enterprises that failed. He is confined in Mount Hope Sanatorium, and it is said that his mind is affected, he being "money mad."

The priest, according to those thrown with him, had visions of acquiring a great fortune, but not for mercenary purposes. The burden of his sorrow that he wished to aid the church and the school in his parish.
Cardinal Gibbons has assumed responsibility for the priest. The cardinal's name was on some of the notes given for money borrowed, including \$28,000, which is a legitimate debt in the church. As to the nature of the hole in which Father Elbert sunk this vast total, the belief is expressed by several persons that no small portion had gone into a venture of a former resident of Baltimore, but now living at Laurel.
By a process, known only to himself, he is said to have claimed that he could mold pure, unrefined copper and nickel, an accomplishment never before achieved. Following the awakening of Father Elbert's interest in this plan, the other man is said to have purchased an old flour mill and to have erected a foundry. Father Elbert was especially enthusiastic over these plans, and is said to have entered into them with material assistance, as well as with moral encouragement.

And so interested in this and other projects, Father Elbert raised money by notes to finance the scheme of various promoters and issuing more notes to take care of original obligations. Interest accumulated, and more notes were dictated to keep the wheels rolling, until at last Father Elbert was obliged to resort to borrowing money on his life insurance policies. With about \$70,000 insurance on his life, he borrowed to the limit by this method and availed the inevitable crash to the very last moment.
Cardinal Gibbons will not be permitted to suffer the total loss in person, as friends are expected to come to the rescue and contribute toward lightening the load. Rich and poor Catholics have come forward with offers of assistance, and one wealthy member of the church was today reported as having signified his willingness to advance the entire amount and accept payment in the future at Cardinal Gibbons' convenience.
