MUTINY OF MARINES.

The marines in the Kaslin barracks, which are situated behind the American Embassy in Constantinople, mutinied Saturday night. They refused to embark for distribution to the various ports. The marines belong to the old disaffected garrison and, although they had nominally surrendered, were in an ugly mood. They were easily persuaded by agitators to make an armed protest against exile from the capital. General Schefket, commander of the forces, lost no time in bringing the mutineers to terms.

After they had surrendered he said: "It was the last flicker of resistance. After we had disposed several battalions of troops and some batteries within easy range of the barracks we inquired which was it to be, obedience to order or the fate of their comrades in the Taksim Arsenal? The white flag was then hoisted on the barracks."

The treasures of the Palace of Yildiz are being inventoried by a parliamentary commission. Abdul Hamid 30 years ago took the open, hilly pastures and gradually transformed them into gardens among which he constructed pavilions for himself, his wives, his children and the palace favorites. He gathered there an immense variety of objects of art and luxury, services of silver and gold, French and Oriental carpets, Greek sculptures taken from the museums of Constantinople, presents from most of the sovereigns of Europe and gifts from wealthy subjects. Within the walls of the palace are artificial lakes, a zoological garden, with a specially fine collection of giraffes; various breeds of camels and rare birds and an automobile course.

The art objects taken from the museums will be returned; the furniture, rugs, porcelains and jewels will be distributed to the other palaces, the new sultan, Mohammed V., taking the choice of these for the Dolmabahce palace, which he is at present occupying. A particular search is being made for the boards of gold which Abdul Hamid is reported always to have had on hand. He has also great sums invested abroad. None, however, has been found as yet, although the former sultan must have had at least a few hundred thousand pounds in the domestic exchequer.

SEVEN PERSONS DROWNED.

An overturned boat, bobbing up and down in a cove off Freeport, N. Y., yesterday, with sail gone and rigging entangled, told another story of a Long Island Sound tragedy. Three boys—David Hults, 16 years old; Henry Ludlow, a year older, both of Merrick, and William Kutz, 15 years old, of West Hoboken, N. J., set out Saturday afternoon on a clamming expedition. A stiff wind was blowing at the time. Night came and night passed, and they did not return, but a shepherd dog which they had taken with them crawled whining to the house of young Kutz in the darkness. Search was then begun which resulted in the finding of the cap-sized boat.

Stricken by heavy rains of the last few days, the Tucasarawa river at Coshocton, Ohio, claimed four victims yesterday when a motorboat capized and threw its six occupants into the river. Two, almost dead of exhaustion, were rescued as they were sinking in the swirling waters for the third time. The dead were: Frank Randles, George Callentine, Welby Callison and John Childs. The six men comprised a pleasure party which set out in the motorboat for a trip down the river. Persons on the bank who saw the boat upset at once started to the rescue. They pulled Christian Hall and Ivan Loos from the swift current.

CHECKS FOR AGED PENSIONERS

Col. Morton Marye, auditor of public accounts, on Saturday mailed checks to pensioners under the act of the assembly of 1888. These pensions are for soldiers wounded in the progress of the war and for dependent widows. The amounts range from \$24 to \$150. The latter sum goes to those who are totally blind. The aggregate of the pensions to be paid at this time is about \$65,000. Pensioners under the acts of 1900 and 1902 will be paid in September. The checks for these will be mailed the first of that month, and should reach the beneficiaries not later than the week following.
