EITHER, BUT NOT BOTH.

In an interview in a Richmond afternoon newspaper, in which he reiterates his determination to offer again for the office he now occupies, Mr. J. Taylor Ellyson declares that, while there is no precedent for a lieutenant-governor standing for re-election, there is also no precedent against his so standing, "any more than there is a precedent against his having been unanimously re-elected chairman of the State democratic executive committee for the last nineteen years.

No, there is no precedent against nor any reason why one and the same person should not be re-elected for an indefinite period to the lieutenant-governorship, provided he is the choice of a majority of the properly qualified suffragans of his party for the office.

Nor is there any precedent against or any reason why one and the same person should not serve indefinitely as chairman of the state democratic committee, provided he is chosen for the position by the properly delegated authorities.

But there is every reason why neither Mr. Ellyson nor any other person should hold the two positions at one and the same time or be a candidate for public office while serving as head of the party organization.

VIRGINIA BANKERS.

After passing upon the report of the legislative committee and electing officers for the ensuing year, the Virginia Bankers' Association, which had been in session at Old Point since Thursday, adjourned Saturday. The executive council will choose the place of meeting for the seventh annual convention.

Officers were elected as follows: President, Henry A. Walter, S. Lynchburg; vice presidents, E. P. Miller, Lynchburg; H. N. Phillips, Williamsburg; W. Mead Addison, Richmond; Julian T. Burke, Alexandria; J. W. Miller, Pulaski; secretary, N. P. Gattling, Lynchburg; treasurer, Julian Hill, Richmond; attorney, George Ryan, Richmond.

A committee was named to purchase loving cups for the retiring president, Joseph Stebbins, of South Boston, and Secretary Gattling. There was a heated debate over the report of the legislative committee, which resulted in the approval of a bill designed to regulate state and private banks, but exempting banks incorporated prior to January 1, 1909, from the provisions of the bill.

This change was a result of an attack made by George A. Schmelz, of Newport News, upon the legislative committee, Mr. Schmelz claiming that the clause requiring private banks to incorporate was aimed particularly against his institution. W. B. Vest, cashier of the Citizens and Marine Bank, that city, and chairman of the legislative committee, made a speech in which he emphatically denied the accusation against the committee.

RESCUED BY A DOG.

Rev. E. T. Ferry, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Morrisville, N. J., and his brother, Rev. Asa Ferry, pastor of the Bethany Temple, Philadelphia, were rescued from drowning in the Delaware river Thursday afternoon by Bob, a large shepherd dog, owned by the Morrisville preacher. The two brothers had gone out in a canoe, and the dog, which accompanied them, took turns running on the bank and swimming after the canoe. Rev. E. T. Ferry turned to see how the dog was getting along and capsize the canoe. Rev. E. T. Ferry was seized with cramps, and his brother went to his rescue. The latter was almost exhausted when Bob arrived. The dog seemed fully alive to his master's danger, and swimming up behind him seized him by the coat and dragged him ashore. Then he returned and rendered similar assistance to Rev. Asa Ferry. The latter says that he had no doubt that both he and his brother owed their lives to the dog.

Guarding the Ossuary.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 24.—Representatives from the Smithsonian Institution, at Washington, will investigate the ossuary on the E. J. Sweeney farm at Osprey, today. Sweeney is keeping guard at the pit containing the skulls and fragments of skeletons of about 300 Indians until the officials arrive. It is said some of the skulls have already been carted away by souvenir seekers who have visited the spot in great crowds since Tuesday. The ossuary is one of the first ever found in the United States, though there are several large ones in Ontario. Dr. A. J. Benedict is inclined to the belief that the bones belong to Indians of the Neuter tribe which were located between the Detroit river on the west and the Genesee river on the east, and were annihilated by the Senecas in 1551.

Boys Die from Alcohol Poisoning. At New York on Saturday the steamer Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, which arrived today from Hamburg, Southampton and Oberhoop, had two deaths in the steerage, both from alcohol poisoning. The victims were two little boys, Herman Schmidt, aged 9 years, and James Karzibar, aged 9 years. These children were not related, but occupied the same compartment. Their parents had given them some liquor to allay stomachache and the children died in convulsions. They were buried at sea.
