STORM AT CONEY ISLAND

A terrific cloudburst descended upon Coney Island and South Brooklyn yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock, accompanied by high winds. A big balloon which was being inflated in Steeplechase Park was blown from its moorings out to sea, and it was reported that one workman was carried off with it.

Sail boats and canoes were upset in Gravesend bay and on the ocean front of Coney Island. Several flimsy structures at Coney Island were destroyed and great damage was done at Steeplechase Park, Dreamland and the other big resorts.

It is feared that there was loss of life in Gravesend bay. The storm came up without warning than a cloudburst of the sky. The wind gathered hurricane force in less than a minute and there was no chance for persons out in craft on the water to get to shore.

The storm vented its full fury on the immense glass-enclosed building in Steeplechase Park. Hundreds of lights of glass were blown in, and the rain swept into the building in torrents. Many small animals, including monkeys, were drowned. The great crowd in the building was panic-stricken, but the full force of the storm did not last over ten minutes.

There was a terrifying display of lightning during the storm. The rain fell in sheets for a while, and finally turned to hail, hail stones, falling ranging from the size of peas to marbles. Bowery and the sidewalks were soon inundated. The flood on Surf avenue stopped the trolley cars for a time.

Lightning struck the new Brighton Beach Theater on Coney Island boulevard just as the afternoon performance was closing. The audience remained in the theatre in a half-state of panic, because the rain was falling too hard to permit any one to make the long run for shelter anywhere else.

To City Tax Payers—Notice

Collector's Office, June 14, 1909. Notice is hereby given that the tax bills for 1909 are now in the hands of the Collector. The attention of parties interested is respectfully called to the following extract from the revenue bill of that year: "Upon all bills payable in full by the 1st day of June, 1909, the Collector of Taxes shall allow a discount of six per cent, and on all bills paid by the 1st day of September, 1909, he shall allow a discount of four per cent, and on all bills not paid on or before the 1st day of December, 1909, there shall be assessed and collected a penalty of five per cent upon the amount of said bills, and on all bills remaining unpaid on the 1st day of June, 1910, damages at the rate of six per cent per annum shall be paid."

Taxpayers would do well to call and pay at once in order to avoid the rush and crowd usually present on the last days in which the discount is allowed.

Bring a list to make sure you get bills for all your property, as the collector will not be responsible for or allow the discount after the time fixed by law. P. F. GORMAN, City Tax Collector.

To the Owners of Dogs.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, Alexandria, Va., June 12, 1909. All persons owning or intending to keep any animal of the dog or canine species should come forward on or before

JUNE TWENTY-EIGHT, 1909 and take out a license for the same from the auditor. After the 20th of June all persons owning or harboring dogs without the required license are subject to a fine, as the laws on the subject require of \$3.00 or \$5.00. Complaint has been frequently made that many persons fail to take out their license, and that other pay on one or two dogs when owning and harboring more, or who send such dogs away during the summer months and bring them back in the fall.

Attention has been called to this evasion of the law and policemen will report all such dogs which are not licensed, and those who fail to take out licenses after trial in the Police Court.

In order to avoid any mistakes, persons who make application for licenses should do well to write their names and number of residence, street, etc., on a card or paper when making application for their licenses to the Auditor.

Attention is called to the fact that while the payment of a license tax is required by the laws of the city, whether a dog is kept on the premises of the owner at all times or not, the payment of such tax does not entitle the dog to the unrestricted use of the streets and alleys of the city, both day and night, for it is provided by law, that: "The Mayor, in addition at any and all times, in his discretion, by proclamation, shall declare that all such dogs as above licensed shall be securely muzzled, and if any such dogs be found running at large during the continuance of such proclamation without the required muzzle, they shall be seized by the police force, or other persons designated by the Mayor of such purposes, and conveyed to a suitable place and destroyed."

The following is a copy of Section 54 of the license law: "In every dog, regardless of sex, one dollar and fifty cents." J. J. 12129.




