The woman lived for 30 minutes, after she had been placed in the Georgetown University Hospital. Mrs. Boardman was on her way home from Washington when the accident occurred. Mrs. Boardman had been to Washington on a visit to a friend. Before leaving Washington she complained of dizziness, and was advised to ride home. But the woman said she wanted a little exercise. Mrs. Boardman and her husband for several years were residents of Georgetown.

END OF THE HOT WAVE.

The Weather Bureau yesterday prognosticated cooler conditions during last night, and the refreshing wave reached this section on schedule time. Shortly after 10 o'clock the heavens became clear and a refreshing northerly breeze was hailed with delight. As the night advanced the temperature fell, and the still breeze eventually became "too much" for many persons whose windows faced the north. The weather today has been clear. The mercury at 8 o'clock this morning stood at 78° but by noon it had risen to 87°.

ELECTRIC ENGINE.

An electric locomotive has arrived at the shops of the Southern Railway in this city. The engine after it shall have been placed in running order will, it is understood, be put upon the Manassas division and will run a train which will connect at Manassas with train No. 15 which leaves this city at 5:12 p. m. The electric locomotive will carry the train as far as Strasburg. The engine, which will generate its own power, is said to be capable of running a mile in 48 seconds.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

Lottie Ashton, colored, died at her home, 809 Wolfe street, last night.

The Alexandria Light Infantry will leave here on Saturday evening for a march to Warrenton and will return on Monday by rail.

The regular business meeting of the Allison W. C. T. U. will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the Children's Home on Duke street.

During the month the clerk of the Corporation Court has recorded 67 deeds and issued 37 marriage licenses—25 to white and 12 to colored persons.

This is the anniversary of the battle of Fraziers Farm, June 30, 1862, in which many members of the Seventeenth Virginia regiment were killed and wounded.

The law requiring certain tug boats to lower their smokestacks that they can pass under the Long and Highway bridges between this city and Washington, goes into effect tomorrow. Some of the tugs have already complied with the law.
