Opening of the Public Schools

The Clerk of the City School Board will be at the Armory Hall for the purpose of issuing permits for entering the Public Schools, which open on SEPTEMBER 7, 8 and 9, as follows: For white children—Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, September 7, 8 and 9, from 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. For colored children—Thursday and Friday, September 9 and 10, from 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. Under the State Laws, all children before entering the Public Schools must be properly vaccinated.

In order that the schools may be properly organized, no permits will be issued after the 11th of the month. Those wishing to secure seats for their children should bring their city capitulation tax receipts for the year 1909.
