EDUCATING NURSES.
Philadelphia has an exhibition of practical benevolence in the work of the Philadelphia School for Nurses which is of interest to every one interested in the care of the sick, the education of nurses and the promotion of public health and sanitation.

The annual report showed that during the past year, ten thousand, two hundred and seventy-five patients were supplied with medicine, who otherwise could not have secured skilled nursing care. Four-fifths of this service was rendered gratuitously. It was shown also that in teaching facilities, available workers and number of students, the school ranks as the largest school for nurses in the world.

Clara Barton, the world renowned nurse and manager of field hospital work, and organizer of the Red Cross Society, having for many years observed the efficient work of the Philadelphia School for Nurses, recently invited Dr. Eugene Underhill, founder of the institution, to visit her, and be present at a conference in her summer home in Oxford, Mass., for the purpose of considering the advisability of reproducing the work in the larger New England cities.

At a public reception, representatives from Lowell, Salem, Worcester, Springfield, Bridgeport, New Haven, Providence and other manufacturing centers, called attention to the need of this service for their respective cities.

Several large classes of students are about to be enrolled in the Philadelphia School for Nurses, who will, doubtless, witness the extension of the work of the institution in accordance with plans now developing as a result of the recent New England conferences. A large number of free two year scholarships are available to young women throughout the entire country, preference being given to those living in the smaller towns and cities, and the rural districts. These scholarships include room, board, laundry, uniforms, all necessary instruction, and railroad fare paid to the student's home town upon the completion of the course. A preparatory home study course and a short resident course are also available to those who desire to quickly prepare themselves for self support, but are unable to devote two years to study. LECTURE ON TRADES UNIONS.
The first of a series of meetings under the auspices of the Federation of Labor of Baltimore, for the purpose of informing the general public as to the aims and objects of the trades union movement, was held yesterday afternoon at Holiday Street Theater, with Stuart Reid, of Chicago, as the lecturer on the occasion.

The speaker at first referred to the opposition shown the labor leaders, stating that the opposition to them was caused mostly, it is claimed, by the spirit of discontent they create. He openly confessed that he is in Baltimore to create discontent among the workmen, the discontent that would cause them to strive for the betterment of their condition. "Yes," said he, "I am a labor leader a labor agitator. I am not a graduate of Princeton, Harvard or Yale; I am graduated from the school that all other labor agitators are graduated from—the school of hard knocks. They don't play football, they are the football. They receive their tuition through bitter experience."

The speaker compared the labor leaders of the present day with George Washington, who, he stated, was one of the greatest agitators the world ever saw, as there would not have been any Boston tea party, no Valley Forge, if it had not been for the agitators who brought discontent among the vassals of King George in this country. If it had not been for the agitators, he said, this country might possibly still be paying duties to England.

"I have no sympathy with the perfectly contented man; show me one of them and I'll show you a perfect jackass," stated the speaker. Continuing, he said: "If I could spread that spirit of discontent in Baltimore I would leave here well satisfied."

The speaker continuing, declared that Christ was the greatest agitator the world ever knew, for it was He who gave to Christianity an eleventh commandment, namely, that of love for fellowman. Upon this commandment, stated the speaker, trades unionism is erected, and upon this commandment it would grow until it gained its aim. "The Christian Church," said Mr. Reid, "is a union in itself, organized 2,000 years ago. Twelve men were the organizers; afterward there were only 11, for Judas Iscariot decided to scab the job, and when he found out that he had scabbed it, he went and hanged himself."
