FALLING FROM THE CLOUDS

How it feels to drop from the clouds in a parachute is thrillingly described in Popular Mechanics by Captain Penfold, the famous Australian aviator. He says:

"Glancing up at your parachute to see if the cords are disentangled, you grasp your trapeze rope by the other, cross your cut away line with the one, cross your legs around your trapeze bar, collect your thoughts and pull the knife. At once the wind rushes past you, the trapeze seems not to hold your weight, you fall as if pushed unprepared, from a high stage into the water at the baths. You look overhead to see the parachute open; the parachute cloth is dropping in a bundle to reach you as it were, but before it does your weight tells and pulls the cord straight; the wind catches under the cloth of your canopy; you have a few anxious moments as it slowly unfolds like a huge umbrella, and with a slight tug (as if a fish were running away with the fishing line) you are supported like a feather, and you experience a feeling of satisfaction and safety. Down you float to terra firma like a bird on outstretched wings, and if it is a calm day your descent is almost vertical at the rate of 8 to 10 feet a second. When nearing the ground the earth seems to rush up to meet you, and what at a height of a thousand feet seemed a small box in a thousand-ton tower now to be a good sized house. You reach the ground in 11 in a free drop from a height of about four feet."—Philadelphia Record.

BUILDINGS WRECKED.

Superintendent of Police Mezer, of Indianapolis, Ind., last night said that his investigation of four explosions of dynamite that wrecked buildings in different parts of that city Sunday midnight had ascertained that they were brought about by a carefully organized conspiracy by enemies of Albert von Spreckelsen, a building contractor, in revenge for his having employed non-union labor. Spreckelsen, fearing further violence yesterday sent his children out of town. His wife remains with him. He employed non-union bricklayers and iron workers on the Mystic Shrine Temple and Theater under construction. He received no warning of the explosion that wrecked his stable and packing mill and two buildings for which he had contracts, a branch of the city library and a branch exchange of the Central Union Telephone Company.

WANT SANE FOURTH.

The National Association of Commercial Executives, at Rochester, New York, has endorsed the movement for a "safe and sane" Fourth of July, and pledged its members to obtain at once the passage and enforcement in American cities of ordinances prohibiting the use of explosives in connection with the annual celebration. The subject was introduced by Richard B. Watson, of Harrisburg, Pa., secretary of the American Civic Association, who addressed the convention on the "Relation of Industrial Organizations to Improvement Work." Mr. Watson announced that at the annual convention of the American Civic Association, to be held at Cincinnati on November 15, a nation-wide campaign will be started for a "safe and sane" Fourth, similar to that observed at Washington, Cleveland and other cities last July.

GOVERNOR CRITICIZED.

At a meeting of the Methodist Ministers' Association in Indianapolis, Ind., yesterday, Gov. Marshall was severely criticized and a resolution adopted censuring him for the following utterance at a meeting of the Associated Charities at Columbus Sunday night:

"When the average man joins the church, Mrs. Millionaire looks at him with her turned up nose and says, 'He cannot sit in my pew; he does not belong to my set.' When the average woman joins the church, her standing in the church depends on the cut of her gown or the style of her hat. If the church of the living God would get back to where every man and woman were a brother or sister, the churches of the state would soon be filled with communicants."

DOUBLE TRAGEDY.

A new and surprising solution to the mysterious killing of two men and the wounding of a third in a saloon in Old York road near Philadelphia on September 27 was made public yesterday, when Michael Comperto, who has been under arrest during the past week, made a confession, in which he admits that he kept guard on the outside of the building while Sebastiano Dimasce, when inside, shot the three men and robbed the cash register. Dimasce was arrested in Jersey City on last Saturday, but denied all knowledge of the crime and fought extradition. After the shooting James Quinn and Henry Saylor, who had both been shot in the stomach, died before they were able to shed any light on the tragedy.
